

## Oregon Golf Team to Meet Huskies Here

Five Men Squads Led by Moe, Hunter to Play 36 Hole Game

Tilt Will Decide Unofficial Championship

Don Moe, of Oregon, and Chuck Hunter of Washington, will meet in a 36 hole match on the Eugene country club links Saturday to decide the unofficial northwest intercollegiate championship.

Moe is Oregon state amateur champion, and was runner-up to Dr. O. F. Willing of Portland for the northwest amateur title.

Hunter is playing his third year as a member of the Washington team. He is the present Washington state amateur champion, and present British Columbia amateur champion.

Moe and Hunter, although friends of long standing have never played together, even in friendly competition.

Dick Richmond, who lost the Washington university championship to Hunter in a sensational 36-hole match, 1 up, will face George Will, No. 2 man for Oregon.

Will won the Portland city championship in 1926, and is present Multnomah club champion.

Gourley, who will play No. 3; Denton Russell, Skagit county champion in 1927, who is No. 4, and Ed Kripe, present Skagit county titlist, who is No. 5. These men have done well in intercollegiate play this season, all shooting in the 70's.

**Oregon Men in Practice**  
Bill Palmberg, Francis Heitkemper and Isaac Staples, are No. 3, 4, and 5 men on the Oregon team. Palmberg is the outstanding golfer in western Oregon; while Heitkemper and Staples are prominent junior members of the Portland golf club.

Although Moe, by his coast ranking, is a slight favorite to down Hunter, the other Washington players seem to have a slight advantage. The outcome, however, probably will hinge on the last match to come in.

## Library Fills Need With Research Files

"Philosophical Transactions of the Royal Society of London," for the years 1908 to 1923, arrived at the main library yesterday.

These are a series of volumes containing papers of mathematical and physical experiments, and are used for research reference work.

According to M. H. Douglass, li-

brarian, it is a series of this nature that the library needs. There is enough material for reserve and general reading but a conspicuous lack of files for research workers, particularly from foreign fields. Files of this sort are both hard to obtain and are very expensive, he says.
