Salt Creek falls is one of the most marvelous sights in the Cascades. The water tumbles over a 300-foot precipice in great volume. Last year 1500 people made the Odell lake trip, and 88 of them saw the falls.

On the closing week of the summer session, August 2, 3 and 4, there will be a trip to Crater lake.

For all of the longer trips, in which it will be necessary to ride in the busses, arrangements are being made with transportation companies for special rates.

Conduct Vision Test
