Local Tennis Men Best Washington Here on Saturday

Oregon Players Capture Net Championship of Northwest

Oregon's quartet of tennis stars won the northwestern inter-collegiate tennis championship Saturday morning when they won all of the six matches played with the visiting Washington team.

To make this sweeping victory even more complete the Oregon freshmen won all three matches with the Washington frosh. Bradshaw Harrison, Oregon's number one man defeated Billy Newkirk, the Washington champion in straight sets, 6-4, 6-1. Newkirk put up a spirited battle in the first set, but Harrison's deceptive change of pace spoiled many of his returns, and his resistance crumpled in the second set.

Stanley Almquist of Oregon defeated Windy Langley of Washington in the second singles match, 6-0, 3-6, 6-3. Almquist had things his own way in the first set, but Langley displayed some wonderful recoveries in the second set, and evened the score. Almquist's light-

ning serve and hard stroking were too much for him in the third set, and the best he could do was to win three games.

Sherman Lockwood's match with Don McLaren of Washington also went into three sets, Lockwood finally defeating the Washington player, 6-2, 3-6, 6-2. Lockwood is showing a wonderful comeback from the handicap of his automobile accident last winter.

Henry Neer had no trouble in disposing of George Hoyt, the fourth man on the Washington team. He won 6-2, 6-1.

In the doubles Harrison and Almquist defeated Langley and Newkirk, 8-6, 6-0; and the Henry Neer and Clare Hartman combination beat Hoyt and McLaren, 6-4, 6-3.

Don Ragan and Jack Rhine, representing the Oregon frosh, were equally successful in their matches with the Washington freshmen, Ragan winning from Hyne of Washington, 6-4, 5-7, 6-3; and Rhine taking

the measure of Ketcham in straight sets, 6-2, 6-3. In the doubles Rhine and Ragan beat a combination of their singles opponents 8-6, 6-4.
