College of Puget Sound Offers Four Credits For Summer

The Summer Student Industrial Research conference in Tacoma June 17 to August 12, will include in its group a delegation from Oregon. Three or four students from each college in the northwest will, through the Tacoma Y. M. C. A., secure jobs in the factories and foundries of the city. They will work for the regular wage, and meet in session two or three times a week for seminar work in which they will be addressed by labor leaders and big business men, as manufacturers. Arrangements have been made with the College of Puget Sound whereby the students may receive four credits for the summer's work. The credits will be accepted by the -University of Oregen, according to United Christian work on the cam-

Qualifications are physical fitness to do hard labor and some work in economics or sociology. After the seminar is closed, the students may remain in their positions until school opens in the fall, although they are not obliged to do so.
