

Final Try-out Of Track Men At Ten Today

Varsity-Fresh Trackmen
On Equal Teams Will
Stage Dual Meet

Work-out in Preparation
To Meet O. S. C. Team

This morning at 10 o'clock the final tryouts for varsity and freshman track teams to compete against O. S. C. next week-end will be held on Hayward field in the form of a dual track meet between the "Reds" and the "Blues."

Bill Hayward has his varsity and fresh tracksters divided into two teams that are of nearly equal strength. This track meet will amount to practically a total display of Oregon's present strength in track. Only two or three varsity men are unable to enter, because of slight injuries.

This afternoon the track squad will make a trip to Corvallis, where there will be a dual track meet between O. S. C. and Washington. It will be the second track meet of the season for the Aggies. In their first one, which was with Idaho, the Staters were not forced to extend themselves to win, and the meet today offers the first chance to get a line on their real ability.

Bill Hayward is making his last bid this morning for dark horses, which he needs on both varsity and fresh teams, but particularly on the fresh. Any one in the university will be permitted to enter the tryouts.

Varsity Players to Join
Teammates for the
Stanford Tilt

Net Matches to be Held at
Palo Alto on Monday

Henry Neer and Stanley Almquist, members of the Oregon varsity tennis team, left at noon yesterday for Palo Alto, where they will meet Bradshaw Harrison and Sherman Lockwood, now playing at the Pacific Coast inter-collegiate meet at Los Angeles, for a dual meet with Stanford university.

The matches will be played on the Stanford courts Monday afternoon, thus allowing Harrison and Lockwood a day's rest after they finish playing in the Los Angeles tournament this afternoon.

Oregon is conceded to have a very good chance to beat Stanford in this meet. The team is immeasurably stronger this year than last, when Harrison, Lockwood, and Almquist, first three men on the team, were ineligible for inter-collegiate competition. The feature match of the day will undoubtedly be between Harrison and Johnny Doeg, who is playing number one on the Stanford team this year.

Doeg is one of the ten ranking players in the country, and on several past occasions has defeated members of the U. S. Davis Cup teams. Harrison is champion of Oregon, Washington, and the Pacific northwest.
