Alpha Hall Heads Men's List Placing 18th in Entire Roll

NEWEST HOUSE LEADS

Chi Delta, a local sorority and youngest of women's living organizations on the campus, has received the honor of topping the grade list of all organizations for spring term. The Chi Delta's stand first with a scholastic rating of 55.294. Alpha Hall heads the men's organizations with a rating of 48.093, and stands in eighteenth place on the entire list.

Alpha Delta Pi and Alpha Chi Omega are second and third on the grade list, respectively. On the men's list Delta Epsilon is second and Phi Sigma Kappa third. Students who have been admitted to the graduate school or to the graduate division of the school of Business Administration were not included in the grade average compilations. Also, withdrawals, incompletes, drops, conditions, and failures were not taken into account. The zoning scale used is that recommended by the American Association of Collegiate Registrars.
