The largest number of students In the history of the university to enroll as residents of the dormitories have listed the various halls as their place of residence for the coming year, it was announced Monday by Hugh L. Biggs, dean of men, when he revealed that 304 students had entered the men's dormitories up to Monday noon. Two hundred and forty women chose the women's halls as their places of residence.

The large dormitory population is due principally to the limitation which has been placed upon the fraternity accommodations during the past year in order to avoid overcrowding, and to the fact that many upperclassmen and graduate students prefer to live in the halls rather than in their respective fraternities.
