MRS. HOOPER SAYS UNITY IS ESSENTIAL

of their wording, is Mrs. Hooper's contention. Such meetings as that of Hoover and MacDonald are indicative of a new era in world politics, she said.

Mrs. Hooper advocated United States entrance in the world court. "It is very important," she said, "that Congress have a proper understanding of the world court." That a unified public opinion would be the greatest help in promoting United States entrance into the world court was her opinion, for "representatives know they cannot go against a united public opinion."

"We can go to war on a majority vote of the United States senate but it takes a two-thirds vote for the same body to ratify a treaty of peace," Mrs. Hooper said. "History may be changed by the vote of one man in the United States Senate," she said. That it is only right that we should have the best representation with the best public opinion back of it, is her belief.


