

1. SAFETY-Right arm raised, first two fingers opened. 2. OFFSIDE—One arm extended, index finger pointing at

3. DEAD BALL-Both arms raised over head, palms for-

4. HOLDING-Both arms extended shoulder high, right 5. CLIPPING, ROUGHING, PILING ON-Right arm ex-

tended to side and extended upward from elbow, fist clenched. 6. INCOMPLETE PASS OR MISSED GOAL - Arms

7. TOUCHDOWN OR GOAL-Both arms raised overhead,

8. TOUCHBACK-Arms raised over head, crossed at 9. PENALTY DEADLINED-Right arm raised in salut-

10. FOUL ON BOTH SIDES-Both arms raised over head. finger tips touching and palms down.

11. INTERFERENCE—Both arms extended in posture suggesting "warding off."
