Washington State Here Friday
Dolph Real Hoop Fnd. . . .
McEwan Returns to Eugene .

COACH Bill Reinhart will have his varsity basketball team on edge for the opening of the conference season this week-end. The strong Washington State Cougars will furnish the Webfoots with their first taste of conference competition this year on Friday and Saturday evenings. Reinhart has a young team, composed mostly of inexperienced players, which he has been nursing along to put in the best possible shape for the league games. He abandoned plans for a barnstorming trip into California during the holiday season as he figured that intensive practice would do the men more good than taking several losses on the trip. His idea seems to have been borne out by the recent showing of the Webfoots.

OREGON turned in two good games against Gonzaga university last week, winning one and losing the second. This showing is all the more impressive when the early season record of the Bulldogs is aired. Gonzaga has chalked up victories over both Idaho and Washington State, both members of the Northwest conference. The Spokane collegians have a rangy, fast breaking team and boast of an exceptional shot in Bertilla. The Webfoots swept the Bulldogs off their feet in the first game, with some classy floor-work and shooting, and came out on the long end of a 34 to 25 score. Gonzaga came back in the final game and won, 29 to 27, but not until Oregon had made a great second half rally. The game brought out some real Oregon fight, when the Webfoots all but tie up the score after trailing 14 to 9 at half time.

VINCENT DOLP, a graduate of last year's freshman hoop team, came to the front in great style against Gonzaga. Dold showed promise of developing into a great star of the maple court and will be a hard man for any team to stop this season. He is a good shot and plays an excellent game. He seems to have won a place as a regular on the varsity and fits in well in Reinhart's style of play. Teamed with Dold at forward is Winsor Calkins, member of the super-varsity last year. This young man has improved greatly under the watchful eyes of the varsity mentor and has turned in several good games this year. He is fast, a good shot, and a good defensive player. Dold and Calkins team well together, and with Roy Hughes, Bill Keenan, and Kermit Stevens as alternates, will ably take care of the forward benches.

LANKY JEAN EBERHART is again holding forth at the pivot position in fine fashion. Eberhart's work under the basket is very valuable and he can be depended upon to get his share of the points. He is one of the three lettermen returning from last year, and his varsity experience has greatly improved his style of play. Cliff Horner, another letterman, and Harold Olinger, super-varsity player last year, are holding down the guard berths on the first five. Horner is a very good defensive player, fast on the floor, and a fair shot. He should steadily improve and would be a valuable man on any team. Olinger is a comer, with plenty of shooting ability and a fair defensive player. There is one man on the squad who will be hard to keep out of the regular lineup after he gets in condition. He is none other than Merv Chastain, a two year letterman at guard, who has enrolled in school again. His return will greatly strengthen the Web-foot squad and he is counted upon as a mainstay of the team.

WITH the return of Captain John J. McEwan from New York, the powers that be will probably go into a huddle to determine some way to straighten out the football coaching situation. McEwan is still the official head coach of Oregon football as his contract does not expire until the end of the present year. His contract calls for a salary of \$8,500 for the year and until he is awarded the proper financial remuneration he will remain head coach. The students of Oregon should be greatly indebted to McEwan for the work he has done to put Oregon on the national sports map, with his very successful football teams. He is a real man.

And in the vanguard of those who made the Twenties a period of progress in all lines can be listed the University of Oregon.
Just what did Oregon accomplish in the decade from 1920 to

YEA OREGON SPORTS

1930? Here are a few items which will tell the advancement story of the decade:

PHYSICAL PLANT

1 Expenditure of approximately \$1,763,517 of University and associated student funds for new buildings on the campus. These include Gerlinger hall, McArthur court, Journalism, Fine Arts memorial, Commerce, new dormitory, architecture, Condon hall, education and music buildings. More than \$200,000 worth of equipment was put in these structures.

2 Erection of nine new fraternity houses and 14 sororities on the campus, involving the expenditure of \$785,500, exclusive of land. Fraternities ranged from \$21,000 to \$40,000; sororities spent from \$18,000 to \$40,000 on their new houses.

ACADEMIC PROGRESS

3 Establishment of a lower division in spring of 1928. Experimentation and broader exploration of different academic fields made possible. Selection of major postponed until junior year in all fields except in architecture, business administration, education, journalism, law, music, physical education or sociology. Poor showings prevent the student from graduating into the upper division and continuing his college work.

4 Creation of honors work for outstanding students. Emphasis placed on individual research and effort rather than on class attendance.

5 Personnel bureau organized to aid in guidance and carry on research into the problems of the student.

6 Establishment of a school of sociology, now the school of applied social science.

7 Raising of entrance requirements, tending toward better-equipped students entering the University.

FINANCIAL PROGRESS

8 Besides the \$1,763,517 spent on campus buildings and the \$785,500 on new fraternities and sororities, the University's income has also risen. This item, however, has not kept pace with the enrollment.

During the Twenties, the number of students at the University jumped from 1,785 in 1919-20 to more than 3,000 in 1929-30—an increase of 60 per cent.

In the same period of time the income of the University from millage tax and other sources raised less than 10 per cent, from \$1,097,549 in 1920 to \$1,231,949 for 1929.

9 Student business, handled by the graduate manager's office, soared from \$43,000 to \$185,000 in the past decade. Where in 1920 \$5,000 was spent for a coaching staff, the A. S. U. O. will spend \$13,000 in 1929-30.

GENERAL PROGRESS

10 There are many items of progress more difficult to set down in print. Effective work has been done along lines of musical activity of the University;

formation and successful operation of useful clubs and organizations, creation of a dormitory policy looking toward less of a gulf between fraternity and non-fraternity men, and expansion of curricula within the departments and schools may all be listed.

Oregon's athletic teams have won many conference championships in every sport—football, basketball, baseball, tennis, swimming, and golf.

*Oregon's faculty has been increasingly active in research and academic lines and members of the faculty presented papers at many large educational conferences all over the United States.

In closing—while the nation was busy popularizing the night clubs, worshipping beauty queens, staging million-dollar prize fights, reading sagas of crime and bootlegging, and inventing a new slang patois of the period, the colleges and universities of America, and among them the University of Oregon, have been matching them stride for stride with progress of a more constructive sort.

What new things will be created during the Thrilling Thirties can only be imagined. The year 1940 will see a campus scarcely similar to the present day one. Progress is rapid. So it's curtains for the Tooting Twenties, a refined way of saying "Here's your hat! What's your hurry?"

The coordination of university with junior college curricula is an important phase of this development, according to Mr. Onthank, who declared that a large number of students who take two years' work at the junior colleges do not go on to finish. For that reason the curricula must be arranged in a manner that will give those students a complete course of study, and still afford others who take the four-year course work which will lead into the upper division curricula.
