

School Plan Adopted After Teachers Meet

Combining of Educational Activities Under One Board Is Feature

Group Would Select State Superintendent

One of the most important features of the 30th Annual State Teachers convention held in Portland December 26, 27, 28, was the adoption of the Oregon Education Plan, according to Dean H. D. Sheldon of the school of education, F. L. Stetson, professor of education was chairman of the directive committee for the preparation of the plan.

Activities Combined

The most outstanding features of this plan are the combining of all the educational activities under one board of education and the county unit system. The proposed board of education would correspond to the state board of higher education with their jurisdiction extended over all the schools.

This board would appoint the state superintendent of schools who would be aided by a competent staff of subordinates.

"This is probably the most revolutionary thing that has happened in Oregon education circles but it presents a logical centralized scheme which will put things up to date," was Dean Sheldon's comment on the proposed plan.

The adoption of the Oregon Plan of education by the association is merely a recommendation and will have to be adopted by the state legislature before it can go into effect.

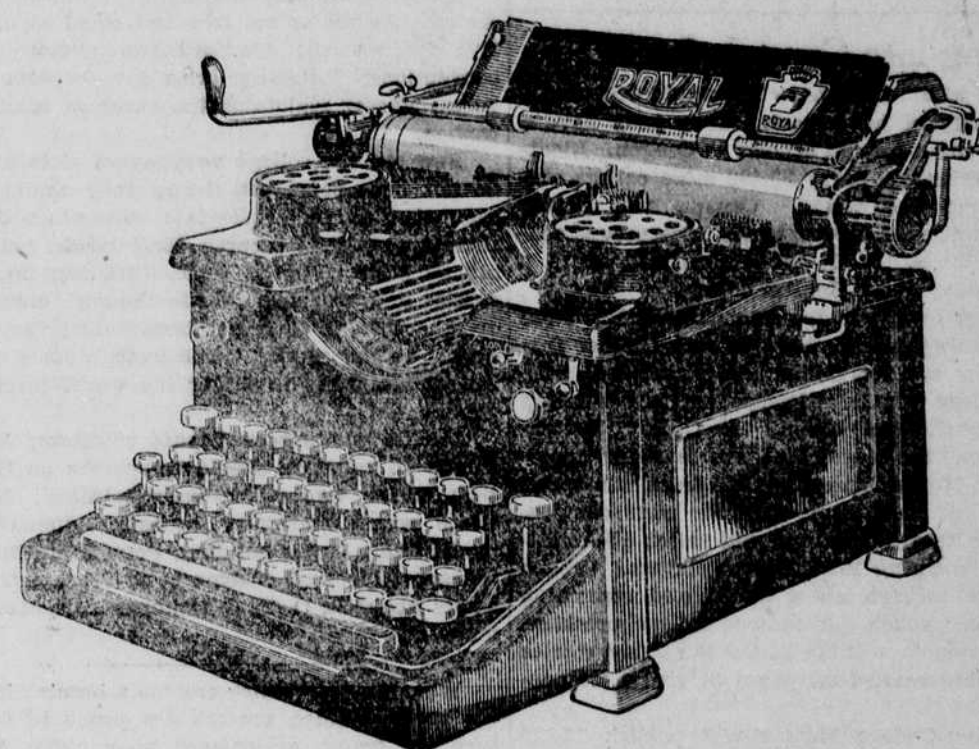

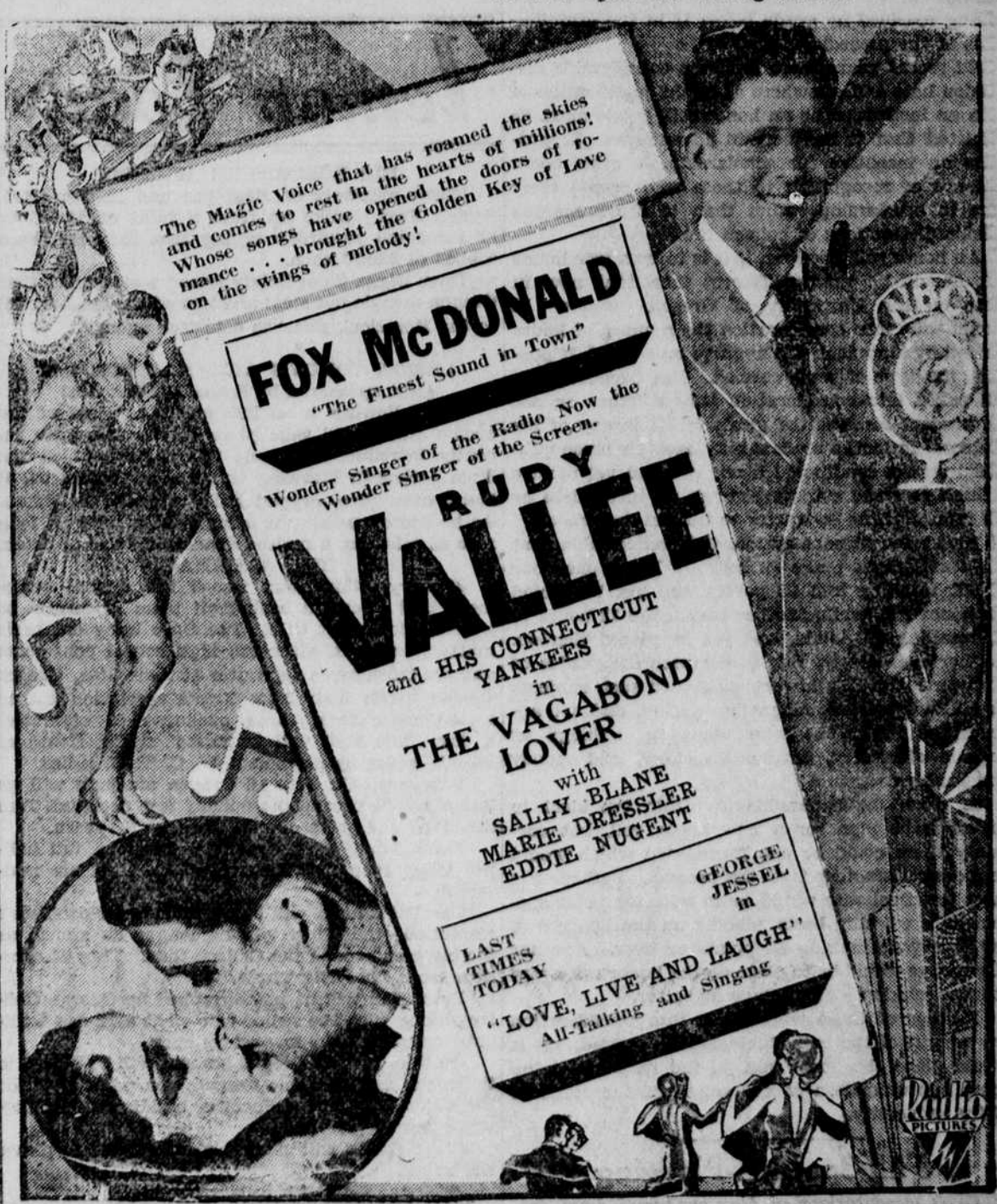
