Program for Big Preppers' Meet Finished

High School Delegates To Hear Talks by Many Noted Speakers

Speech by Stoddard Will Open Conference

The entire program for the Tenth Annual High School Conference, to be held at the University of Oregon January 10 and 11, has been announced as complete in every detail by Stanford Brooks, student chairman in charge of arranging the program.

Brooks and his assistant committee men have Stan Brooks been working at the task of forming a program for the convention for a month. The job was completed and sent to press Tuesday.

Chairmen Named
The students who handled the arranging of the program were: Harry Van Dine and Rex Tussing, Press conference; Helen Peters, Girls' League; Kathryn Fry, Deans' conference; George Cherry, Principals' conference; Anne Stange, banquet; Bill Knox, entertainment, and Omar Palmer, campus tour.

The meet will be officially opened Friday morning at 9 o'clock when Tom Stoddard, president of the associated students, welcomes the delegates to the University of Oregon, at a general meeting of all preppers and faculty advisors.

Allen to Speak
From 10 o'clock Friday morning until 4 o'clock that afternoon the individual groups will meet. Dean Eric W. Allen, of the University of Oregon, school of journalism, will be one of the principal speakers at the Press conference. The subject of his address to that group is "The Place of High School Publications in School Life."

Arthur L. Stone, dean of the school of Journalism of the University of Montana, will speak on "The Profession of Journalism." The members of the teaching staff of the Oregon Journalism school, professional men and students heading the University publications complete the list of speakers.

The activities of the High School Student Body Officers will be confined mainly to round table discussions, with prominent high school officers of the entire state taking part. Hugh L. Biggs, assistant dean of men at Oregon, will be the principal speaker.

Style Show on Program
Miss Alice Hoyt, assistant dean of women at the University of California, will deliver an address to the Girls' League association on "The High Cost of Self-Government." Another feature of the Girls' League conference will be in the form of a style show under the direction of Gladys Clausen, Oregon student.

Dean W. L. Uhl, University of Washington, will speak to the high school principals on the subject "The Improvement of Classroom Instruction." Dr. Howard R. Taylor, associate professor of psychology at Oregon, and Virginia Judy Esterly, dean of women at Oregon, will be the main speakers for the Deans' conference.

Picture Scheduled
All conference delegates will get together again Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock. Group pictures and motion pictures will be taken by George Godfrey, member of the faculty committee for the conference. As soon as the pictures are taken the delegates will be taken on a tour of the Oregon campus, which has been arranged by Omar Palmer.

Studies To Be Big Feature of Winter Quarter

There will not be a single day of vacation during the quarter for which students registered last Thursday, according to Earl M. Pallet, registrar. Homer Angell, '00, of Portland, attorney and representative in the state legislature from Multnomah county, was elected president of the University of Oregon alumni association at 6 o'clock Tuesday night. Mae D. Kinsey, '05, of Eugene, teacher in the Eugene high school, and Carl Nelson, '19, Salem business man, were elected vice-presidents. Jeannette Calkins, editor of "Old Oregon," alumni magazine was re-elected secretary-treasurer, and Dr. Edwin R. Durno, of Grants Pass was chosen to the executive committee.

The mail ballots, sent in by the voting alumni, were counted by an alumni committee and the vote was said to be one of the closest in history. Angell lead Senator Edward F. Bailey, '13, of Junction City by 12 votes when the final vote was taken, said Miss Calkins, in charge.

The new president was prominent in football while in the University and after his graduation went to Columbia university, New York, where he won high athletic and scholastic honors. John C. Veatch, of Portland, is the retiring president.
