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The Oregon Daily Emerald, official publication of the Associated Students of the University of Oregon, Eugene, issued daily except Sunday and Monday, during the college year.

LET STUDENTS VOTE. Again the problem of students voting in Eugene elections has raised its head.

A year ago last fall the Emerald and the campus were involved in an interesting word battle over the legality of students voting in the national presidential election.

Now these same students were not counted by census-takers this year and since their oath of residence taken at the polls contradicts their statements on census blanks, trouble has arisen.

That such a condition should arise on the campus where the right of students to take an interest in national, state, and local politics is challenged is unfortunate.

It is probably based on misunderstanding on the part of the students when they filled out census blanks. The majority without doubt did not recall that their being registered voters in Eugene automatically made them residents of the city.

On the census blanks was a provision that if the student had parents in some other city who were likely to enumerate him, it would not be necessary for him to fill the blank further.

Eugene has a right to expect that students who are registered in city precincts should help swell its population total and not be counted by some other city.

A re-enumeration of the census fraternities, as promised by Mr. Koke, district census supervisor, will help straighten out the difficulty.

Students are the future citizens of the nation and if they are interested in the way their city or state is run, such a feeling should be encouraged.

The present crux is mostly caused by misunderstanding on their part and need not be raised into the realm of political skulduggery by rumor.

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NEW ASSOCIATION OF STUDENTS OFFICERS TO BE NOMINATED TODAY AT ASSEMBLY; IMPORTANT CHANGES UP FOR CONSIDERATION OF VOTERS; CLASS ELIGIBILITY OF MAJOR CHANGES MADE.

On the acceptance of the proposed A. S. U. O. constitution, which follows, depends the election of student officers nominated today—on it depends a bond issue to extricate the student funds from bankruptcy—on it depends the possibility of a workable constitution at all.

Attention of students is called especially to Article III, in which new officers are provided for, and in which it is required that elective officers must have regular students at the University of Oregon. Recent transfers are here barred. Too, no officer may be twice elected.

Other important changes are: requirement of statements of candidacy, provision in Article IV for student majority in the executive council, retention of central power for the council, provision for appointment of yoll king, judiciary with individual appeal permitted, provision of a model class constitution, provision for announcement in the Emerald of all class meetings, and the debated class identity provisions. These last determine eligibility for student office.

By-laws contain much of the important material. Some changes—the managerial, awards, and salaries sections—will be permanent resolutions of the executive council.

CONSTITUTION PREAMBLE

We, the students of the University of Oregon, in order to promote and maintain those activities and interests which will contribute to the educational, physical and social well being of the Associated Students of the University of Oregon, to ordain and establish the following Constitution and By-Laws.

Article I Name and Membership

Section 1. NAME. The name of the association of students under this Constitution shall be the Associated Students of the University of Oregon.

Section 2. MEMBERSHIP. All registered undergraduate students in the University of Oregon shall be members, provided such members have not been forfeited or relinquished as hereinafter provided in this Constitution.

Article II Meetings

Section 1. REGULAR MEETINGS. There shall be two regular meetings of the Associated Students of the University of Oregon each year. The first one shall be held on the last Thursday in April each year, at which meetings nominations shall be made for the officers of the University of Oregon.

Section 2. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings shall be held upon the call of the Executive Council on its own initiative or upon the petition of 200 members; provided that twenty-four hours notice shall be given by publication of said notice in the Oregon Daily Emerald.

Section 3. QUORUM. Five hundred members shall constitute a quorum.

Article III Officers

Section 1. GENERAL OFFICERS. The officers of this association shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Judiciary, a Student Relations Officer, and a Senior Finance Officer, all of whom shall be chosen from the membership of the A. S. U. O.

Section 2. QUALIFICATIONS OF CANDIDATES FOR ELECTIONS. Candidates for the offices of President, Vice-President, Secretary, Executive Man and Executive Woman must be of junior standing at the time of the nomination.

Section 3. ELECTION TO ANY STUDENT BODY OFFICE. Any student who has been elected to any student body office shall be ineligible to be elected to any other student body office for a period of one year following the expiration of his term.

Section 4. VACANCIES AND SPECIAL ELECTIONS. Permanent vacancies in the office of Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Student Relations Officer, and Senior Finance Officer shall be filled by a special election.

Section 5. TENURE OF OFFICE AND INSTALLATION. The officers of this Association shall hold office for one year, beginning on the first day of January, and shall be elected and qualified, unless otherwise stipulated in this Constitution.

Section 6. OATH OF OFFICE. The retiring President shall give the following oath of office to all incoming officers: "I do hereby solemnly pledge and affirm that I will perform to the best of my ability, the duties of the office to which I am elected, and will use my best efforts to promote the best interests of the Associated Students of the University of Oregon."

Section 7. RECALL. A special student body election, for the recall of any officer, shall be held at the request of twenty-five (25) per cent of the members of the Associated Students. At this election it will be necessary to secure the signatures of the voters to recall the officer in question.

Section 8. DUTIES OF OFFICERS. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Council and shall have the general and special duties delegated to him by this Constitution and such other duties as may be necessary to him.

Section 9. THE SENIOR FINANCE OFFICER shall assume the duties of the Senior Finance Officer in case of the absence of that officer. He shall perform all duties delegated to him by this Constitution and such other duties as may be necessary to him.

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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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PAINTINGS GO ON DISPLAY

Work of Leading Artists Shown in Collection From East.

A group of 20 oil paintings, including landscapes, portraits, and marines, by leading artists will be placed on exhibition in the gallery of the school of architecture and allied arts today, and will remain for two weeks.

This is the only exhibition from the East that the school has shown this year, and is regarded by the art school faculty as an outstanding collection of works.

The group of paintings is supplemented by a group of 15 flower and still life subjects by Margaret Spencer, and is assembled by the American Federation of Arts.
