Marine Paintings **Put on Exhibition**

Art Gallery Displays Work Of Famous Artists

Among the foremost American marine painters whose paintings are on exhibit in the art gallery of the school of art and architecture this week is Charles H. Waterbury, who has proved his versatility in his vigorous etch-

Woodbury derives his inspiration for his pictures of ocean and rugged coast from a sojourn at Ogunquit, Maine, where during the summer he gathers about him a group of students of landscape and marine, through whom his influence has been strongly impressed v upon contemporary production.

The work of Jonas Lie, a wellknown painter of nature, is also represented in the exhibition. Lie knows all the aspects of nature, and refuses to stick to any one of them in painting, just because it strikes the popular fancy, but paints what and when he pleases. In consequence, his work has infinite variety and can never tire his admirers. Industrial scenes, river and harbor scenes, landscapes and marines, and the hardy men who live by the sea, are some of his subjects.

The paintings were sent to the art school by the American Federation of Arts, and will remain three more weeks.
