#### Is Former Editor

Dr. Rowell has had a distinguished career as a student, a traveler, publisher, and lecturer, and has devoted years of study to international relations. He was for several years editor of the Fresno California, Republican, and has also been an active writer for the Oakland Tribune.

"Chester Rowell is regarded throughout the country as one of the ablest speakers on foreign affairs that is availbale in America," declared Dr. Arnold Bennett Arnold Bennett Hall, Vice-presi- Hall, president of the University.
