

Class Officers To Be Elected At Polls Today

Juniors To Vote in Villard; Frosh To Cast Ballots In 202 Condon

SOPHS NOT ELECTING

Class Nominates But One Candidate for Each Position

Class politics will take the center of the stage today when polls open at 9 o'clock for balloting on next year's senior and sophomore class officers. Senior class elections will be held in Villard hall, and sophomore elections will be held in room 202, Condon hall. Polls will close promptly at 3 p. m.

No elections will be held by the sophomore class, since Art Potwin, Carolyn Haberlach, Alice Wingate, and Joe Hughes were the sole nominees for the four junior class offices. This was definitely determined at midnight of Saturday, May 10, when the time limit specified for the entering of candidates in the race by petition elapsed.

This is something unique in campus elections, according to Tom Stoddard, who declared that inasmuch as there were no candidates opposing the four nominated at the assembly held last Thursday and because the class had made and passed a motion to declare the nominated candidates unanimously elected if no further candidates were nominated by petition, the formality of an election would be dispensed with.

The new junior class officers are: Art Potwin, Salem, president; Carolyn Haberlach, Tillamook, vice-president; Alice Wingate, Portland, secretary, and Joe Hughes, Astoria, treasurer.

Candidates Named

Candidates for senior offices are: president, Joe Freck and Bill Pittman; vice-president, Dorothy Eberhard and Orpha Ager; secretary, Kathryn Langenberg; treasurer, Gordon Gardner and Ken Moore.

Freshmen will vote on the following candidates for sophomore officers for 1930-31: president, Fred Hellberg and Jim Travis; vice-president, Lucille Kraus and Mary Lou Muncy; secretary, Marian McIntyre and Ardis Ulrich; treasurer, Bob Goodrich and Spec Stevenson.

A. S. U. O. Cards Necessary

All freshmen who wish to vote must present student body cards at the door of the polls, or else must be identified by someone known to the judges, it was announced last night by Bill Morgan, chairman of the freshman election committee.

This precaution has been taken to prevent fraudulent voting, Morgan explained, and to minimize the possibility of students voting more than once. No electioneering will be permitted inside the building, he warned.

Clerks and judges for the sophomore elections were named yesterday by Morgan. Four clerks and two judges will be on duty (Continued on Page Two)

Eight Pre-legal Students Will Compete for Three Prizes

Contestants Represent the Best of Talent

Eight pre-legal students will compete tonight at 7:30 in room 105 Oregon hall in the finals of the Wilson Jewett oratorical contest, sponsored annually on the campus by Wilson Jewett, Sr., of Eugene.

The contestants tonight have been chosen from a field of 42 students who wrote and delivered orations in a series of elimination contests which have been held during the past month. According to the instructors in charge, the speakers tonight represent the best talent chosen from the original two score entrants. Prizes will be \$25, \$15, and \$10.

Subjects Varied

The speakers and the subjects of their orations are as follows: John V. Long, "The Injustice of Justice"; Walter Evans, "Disarmament"; Philip Hammond, "Chicago and the Nation"; Wallace Baker, "The Strategy of Peace"; Hobart Wilson, "The Temple of Armaments"; Stanley Darling, "The Prohibition Law"; Charles Stocklen, "The College Athlete"; and Roger Pfaff, "The Peace of the Pacific." All the contestants are sophomores.

Judges for the contest will be Dr. James H. Gilbert, dean of the college of literature, science and the arts, Wayne Y. Morse, assistant professor of law, and Arthur B. Stillman, assistant professor of business administration.

Public Invited

The contest is open to the public and no admission charge will be made. Anyone interested in public speaking is cordially invited to attend by those in charge of the contest.

The contest will serve as class instruction for some students, for all members of the classes in Exposition 258 will be required to attend as part of their fulfillment of regular class work in the course.

Waggoner, Winetrou, and Killion Coach Selves, Pay Expenses, Defeat

For six months three Oregon students fenced diligently in the wrestling room of the men's gym. For a time they received instruction from Warren Powell, a student himself and Northwest champion last year, but as his studies intervened the men were forced to do their own coaching. They became the Oregon team without opposition.

At Corvallis Saturday this same trio, Dick Waggoner, Lee Winetrou, and Dave Killion, met and defeated the best college swordsmen of the Northwest in a triangular meet between O. S. C., Oregon, and W. S. C. Dick Waggoner, who had never fenced before this year, is now the individual champion of the Northwest.

Oregon Leads List

Opposing Oregon in the tourney were two schools having beginning and advanced classes in fencing—over seventy men striving to make the squad at Oregon State and all ably coached by the veteran instructor, Otto Mauthe. However, when the matches were over Oregon was found at the head of the list after winning 11 out of 18 duels. O. S. C. breaking even with nine victories and as many defeats, while the Cougar swordsmen accounted for only seven triumphs against 11 losses.

I met Senator Hall after church Sunday and walked down to the hotel with him. We talked about various things, his wind-up campaign, his record in the senate, but it wasn't very interesting. After we got in the lobby, we found none of the davenport and chairs vacant—and it was a good thing, too, because Charles Hall, candidate for Republican nomination for governor, is at his best seated in front of a desk. And a lobby writing desk was the only place that was left.

After he had struck what appeared to be his typical business pose, with a desk in front of him, he seemed to open up, and it was then that he became thoroughly himself.

"Of course, as far as the University is concerned," he said, "my record in the Oregon state senate shows that I have been very favorable—and there is another good indication of my support of the University." He pointed to Keith

Errors Give Webfoots Win From Huskies

Game Goes Eleven Innings Before Ducks Gain 7 to 6 Victory

TEAMS BATTLE TODAY

Oregon Leading Northern Conference With Five Wins

Oregon finally beat the Huskies yesterday in eleven wild innings of baseball, 7-6. The Webfoots scored the winning run on three Washington errors—what a game! By the victory, however, the Webfoots slipped into the undisputed lead of the northern conference with five wins against one defeat.

Washington grabbed the lead in the first canto and held onto it until the eighth. Three of the first four men up banged singles off MacDonald's offerings and both Wilson and Tollefson crossed the plate.

Tollefson added another run to the Purple's count in the third. After doubling he tallied on Stevens' boot. Oregon scored their first one in the third, too. Kermit Stevens drew a bye and Robie was hit by the pitcher. Gabriel forced Robie at second, but Stevens went to third and scored on a passed ball.

Londahl Scores

Gau's circuit blow in the first half of the fifth with one on base gave Washington two more runs. Oregon came back in the last half, however, with a pair of markers. Londahl and MacDonald singled, and Stevens walked to crowd the bases. Robie beat out an infield hit to short, Londahl scoring. Gabriel knocked out a long fly which enabled MacDonald to tally after the catch.

The Webfoots kept after the Huskies, making their total four and coming up within one run of Washington's lead in the sixth. Franny Andrews tripled to open the Ducks' half of this frame. From here he trotted home on Mimnaugh's smash. Londahl hit without doing any damage except to send the Husky pitcher to the showers. McLean, a left-hander took Gau's place in the box. MacDonald hit into a double play to wipe out the side.

Seventh Canto Slippy

The seventh was a slack inning, but things livened up in the eighth, when in the excitement Oregon scored two runs and went into the lead for the first time. With one away, Andrews walked and Hoag singled. Londahl fouled out, but the Husky defense shattered—a couple of errors, and two runs were in.

This should have made it the Webfoots' game. However, Washington couldn't give up, and in the ninth W. Gau, who was the star slugger for the northern crew, singled to score Nelson who was camping on second at the time.

Tension High

The tension became high in the eleventh, when MacDonald purposely walked Gau and then couldn't keep from walking Hutchinson to fill the bags. The "Big Train" had some stuff left, however, and fanned Brown for the third out. Washington went to pieces in the Webfoot half. Barberis had a tough time at second. Stevens was safe on his error, and after Robie's sacrifice, Gabriel hit another one to Barberis who scooped the ball up—then dropped it. Stevens, who was on second rounded third, and raced for the plate. Barberis picked the ball up and threw perfectly to home in plenty of time, but Kermit took a big slide and when the dust had cleared away there was the ball lying out on the diamond. The catcher had dropped it, and Oregon won.

The Huskies rested up for another game this afternoon on Reinhardt field by being guests at the McDonald theater. Nevins, Washington's star, will probably hurl for them today, while Ken Scales without doubt will pitch for the Webfoots.
