Addresses Are Supplied

Big Sisters are supplied during the summer with names and addresses of prospective freshman girls. They correspond or communicate with their little sisters, and advise them, if possible, about courses. All Big Sisters meet just before registration week and are given final instructions about registration procedure, so that they may help their little sisters register. Incidentally, Big Sisters get their own registration material early. They also function at the Get-Wise party, held for freshman women the second or third week
