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

the South Pole and return. Nine reels of motion pictures will be shown in connection with the lecture. A special projection house has been built in the court, two of the best machines available have been sent down from Portland with a trained operator, and a huge magnascopic screen, of the type which gives the pictures a three-dimensional appearance, installed.

Fortunately, Admiral Byrd is a lecturer whose easy delivery and fascinating personality enable him to tell his story with a maximum of interest. There will be no subtitles for the pictures; Byrd will stand by and give a running explanatory account as they are thrown onto the screen.

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
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
