Norris To Speak On Development Of Shale Oil Here

Shale oil is a potential source of energy hitherto little developed, according to Dr. Norris, of the physics department, who will lecture Thursday night on "The Distillation of Oil Shales."

Shale oil is obtained from shale rock, which contains all of the organic substances necessary for the production of the oil, but which is useless until the rock is heated in a closed vessel and the oil distilled. "This oil has all of the advantages of petroleum," says Dr. Norris, "and there is no reason why it should not become as common a source of energy as petro-
