The penalty to be imposed hereafter will be a cancellation of registration with disbarment from reentry for the remainder of the term. The committee considers such falsification as being a double offense involving deliberate misrepresentation and inadequate compliance with the requirements for registration.

Justification of the grounds on which offenders will be denied permission to re-register is the presence of the element of deceit. Failure to give the correct Eugene address will be an omission fatal to the completion of registration.
