



Limitation of Free Speech Criticized At Congress Club nounced.

Criminal Syndicalism Acts Called Inimical to Democracy

Criminal syndicalism statutes were roundly scored at a meeting of the Congress club last night, and denounced as dangerous to liberty in the United States. Stephen B. Kahn, freshman in journalism, presented the subject and reviewed the current restrictions on freedom of speech.

He pointed out that 33 states. including Oregon, Washington, Idaho and California, have crimiit felonious to advocate, suggest | linger building. or justify unlawful methods to bring about political or industrial revolution. "The Ohio statute was declared unconstitutional yesterday by the supreme court," said

Education Important

Defending freedom of speech, he said, "Various legal measures have been advanced for extending liberty of expression, but I feel the greatest protection lies in a strong citizenry, intelligent and unwilling to be bluffed. Education is better than legislation."

England was praised as possessing the greatest measure of free speech, while Russia and Italy were condemned for ruthless suppression of individual liberty. It was agreed that restriction of speech and press was a dangerous Triumphant Score 9 to 0; practice, and inimical to the maintenance of democracy. Kahn was unanimously effected
