

Webfoots Find Batting Eyes with Lopsided 17-0 Triumph over Idaho Baseball Team

Oregon Squad Starts Socking Ball With Zest

Dave Bloom Is Stingy With Hits, Allowing Four; Walks None

Second Vandal Tilt Slated For Today; Scales May Pitch

Amassing a score that left no doubt about the victory, the Webfoot baseball sluggers chalked up their first win of the season against Idaho yesterday afternoon at Reinhart field. The Oregon players all commenced hitting at once, and when the smoke lifted at the end of the ninth the local boys were 17 runs to the good.

Dave Bloom, on the hill for the Webfoots, let down the Vandals with four hits and a row of goose eggs for runs. The Duck right-hander was placing the ball right where he wanted it. After the fourth inning he coasted into victory.

Aided by 12 walks and seven errors, the revamped Oregon line-up crashed out 17 hits, including a home run smack by Johnny Londahl and three-baggers by Stevens and Bloom. In the hectic fourth, eight Ducks crossed the plate, three went over in the next session, and five in the eighth.

Oregon Scores in Third
Jacobs, the starting Idaho pitcher, was shooting the onion in too fast for the good of his team, although he breezed through the first three innings without much

trouble. Oregon found him in the third when Dave Bloom led off with a double. Two errors and a walk sandwiched in between shoved the Webfoot hurler across the pan.

Then the historic fourth arrived. Chappie King worked Jacobs for a walk. Johnny Londahl attempted to sacrifice him to second, but he bunted foul on the third strike and was automatically out.

Dave Bloom caught one on the nose for a triple, which brought King home. A hot single between first and second by Cliff Potter, followed by another hit from Kern Stevens' bat, tallied another run and put two Ducks on the bags.

Errors Raise Total
The Idaho center fielder muffed up Barnes' single. As a result Potter and Stevens scored while the speedy Barnes dashed to second. Another error by Lee, Vandal keystone man, put the Oregon middle gardener on third.

Brian Minnaugh walked and immediately pliffed second. On Duke Shaneman's easy bounce to third, Barnes set sail for home instead of playing safe. Kyselke threw him out with ease.

When Lee Chester planted the ash against one of Jacobs' fast shoots, Shaneman and Minnaugh both romped home. King came up again, drawing his second walk of the inning. A wild pitch and Londahl's single tallied two more runs. Bloom obligingly fanned to give the scorekeeper a chance to catch up.

Coach Yanks Pitcher
After two safe wallops and Barnes' absorption of a fast one against the third rib, Coach Rich Fox sent in Lacy to replace Jacobs as the Idaho chucker. The big fellow retired the side after allowing another hit and a free ticket to first.

With the score 12 to 0, Reinhart's boys refused to concede victory to themselves. In the eighth they hung up five more tallies to show the fans that they are acquiring the habit. A triple by Stevens, passes to Shaneman and Palmer (batting for Chester), and a two-base swat by King chased over three runs. Johnny Londahl clapped on the finishing touch by poking the ball over the left field fence.

New Line-up Makes Good
Big Lacy, who took seven runs on the chin during his sojourn on the firing line, showed plenty of smoke and an ability to mix it with slow stuff, but he didn't have much of an idea where the ball was going. Giving out seven free tickets to first was his downfall.

The drastic shifts made by Billy Reinhart this week were justified by yesterday's massacre. Lee Chester held down the initial sack in creditable fashion, while Londahl sparkled at second. Chappie King played third with Potter, Barnes, and Minnaugh cavorting in the outer gardens.

Teams Meet Today
Kermit Stevens, Oregon's fancy shortstop, was the hitting star of the day. Kern banged out four in four, including a double and triple. Bloom had a single, double, and triple to his credit besides walking once. Besides the homer, Londahl collected two other safe blows.

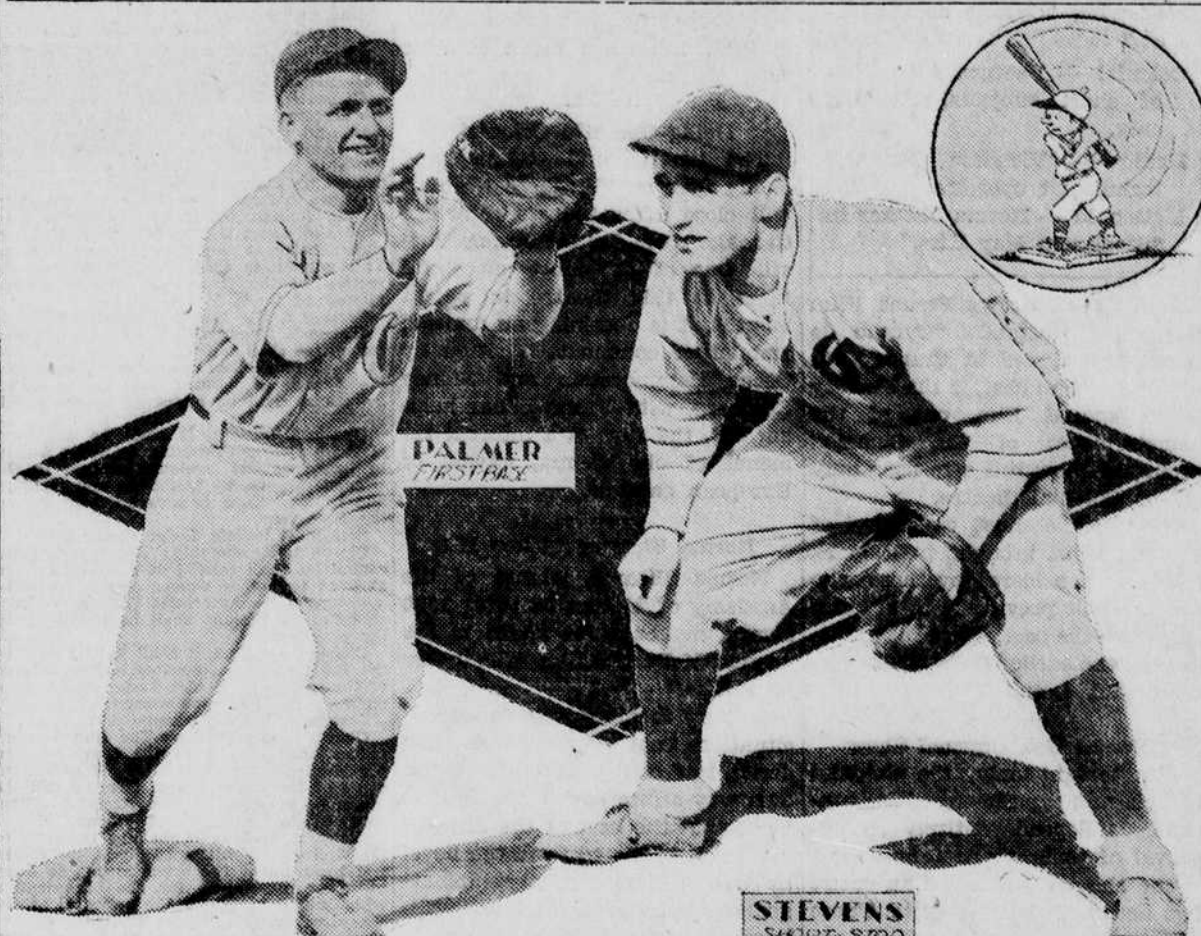

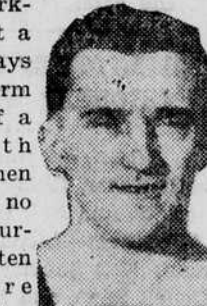

Limitation of Free Speech Criticized At Congress Club

Criminal Syndicalism Acts Called Inimical to Democracy

Criminal syndicalism statutes were roundly scored at a meeting of the Congress club last night, and denounced as dangerous to liberty in the United States. Stephen B. Kahn, freshman in journalism, presented the subject and reviewed the current restrictions on freedom of speech.

He pointed out that 33 states, including Oregon, Washington, Idaho and California, have criminal syndicalism laws, which make it felonious to advocate, suggest or justify unlawful methods to bring about political or industrial revolution. "The Ohio statute was declared unconstitutional yesterday by the supreme court," said Kahn.

Education Important
Defending freedom of speech, he said, "Various legal measures have been advanced for extending liberty of expression, but I feel the greatest protection lies in a strong citizenry, intelligent and unwilling to be bluffed. Education is better than legislation."

England was praised as possessing the greatest measure of free speech, while Russia and Italy were condemned for ruthless suppression of individual liberty. It was agreed that restriction of speech and press was a dangerous practice, and inimical to the maintenance of democracy. Kahn was unanimously elected to the Congress club. Presentation of an address is prerequisite

to membership in the organization. "Debunking national heroes" will be the subject for discussion at the next meeting, it was announced.
