

# 573 Apply for Degrees From University Passing Last Year's Commencement Mark

## Portlanders Top List With Eugene Next

### Graduation Exercises Set June 13 to 15 on Local Campus

### Many Diploma Candidates From Out of State, Records Show

Candidates for degrees from the University of Oregon this spring total 573, according to figures released from the office of the registrar, Earl M. Pallett. Of this number 214 are from Portland, while 104 claim Eugene as their home town. The remainder are divided between towns of Oregon and those out-of-state and in foreign countries. This number is nearly 50 greater than the number
