Advanced Drama Production To Be Given at Session

Course To Be Offered First Time This Summer To Students

Extension work in the University drama department will be made this summer with the addition of a course in advanced play production, Mrs. Otilie Turnbull Seybolt, head of the department announced yesterday.
 "This will be the first time that such a course has been offered," Mrs. Seybolt said, "and it is designed principally for those who have had some experience in directing and desire to work for graduate credit."

In addition to the special advanced course to be given this summer, the drama department will offer the regular course in play production for beginners and a course in phonetics. A course in interpretation and impersonation will be offered especially for teachers of oral English and undergraduates who wish to do preliminary work toward courses in acting.

At least one dramatic program, and probably more, will be given during the summer session, according to Mrs. Seybolt's plans. People who will be in town during the summer and would enjoy participating in a play are asked to leave their names in Mrs. Seybolt's office at their earliest convenience. Mrs. Seybolt said that it would not be necessary for these people to be registered in the summer session to be eligible for a part.

Virgil Earl Looks Forward to Work As Dean of Men

Virgil D. Earl, director of athletics and the man who will fill the office of dean of men next year, said yesterday, "I would rather anticipate than deal with students' problems." It is his wish that he be given the confidence of germinating problems before they grow in magnitude.

"Too often," said Mr. Earl, "the students are wanted to do what a dean's office dictates." He said that in this capacity he wanted to be of service to the students.

Mr. Earl has been keeping in close contact with the office of Hugh L. Biggs, president dean of men, throughout the term and becoming familiar with the work transacted there. He extends an "appreciation of the courtesies and kindnesses extended in other capacities on the campus and asks the further cooperation of the students."

Over 100 Unlucky Students Unable To Get Oreganas

THE graduate manager's office has had to turn down more than 100 students who wished to buy copies of the 1931 Oregana after it was issued yesterday by Ronald H. "Doc" Robnett, assistant graduate manager. This year for the first time, he said, yearbooks were refused to all who neglected to sign up for them during the sales campaign winter term; and hereafter this policy will be strictly carried out.
 More than 2000 copies of the Oregana were printed this year, Robnett disclosed, and 1700 copies were sold to students—breaking all previous records.

Dr. DeBusk To Direct Summer School Clinic

The summer school clinic, under Dr. B. W. DeBusk, of the University of Oregon education department, and Dr. Grace Fernald, of the education department of the University of California at Los Angeles, will start June 24. It deals with individuals who are retarded in reading, writing, and spelling. Children come from all parts of the United States, Hawaii, and Alaska to this clinic, where they are examined and diagnosed, so that they may be taught according to their personal difficulties.

Dr. Fernald and DeBusk, aided by Miss Lillian Rainer, instruct the student teachers and supervise teaching of individual cases. A large percentage of these cases are motor minded and thus receive insufficient training in the regular schools. They seldom learn to write or spell without special treatment.

This clinic has operated for four years and is gaining a marked popularity. The New York Times and the Boston School Journal praised the school and its work in recent issues.



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
