

Schedule For Annual Derby Is Announced

Freshmen Only To Be in Receiving Lines
Men Will Spend 10 Minutes At Each Sorority or Hall Visited

With 46 campus organizations participating, Open House, annual get-acquainted event inaugurating social activities for the year, will be held Saturday evening.

Only freshmen women will be in the receiving lines at sorority houses and women's halls, thus reducing materially the time taken up in formal introductions and allowing more time for dancing. All men are to go down the receiving lines, arranged by class rank—seniors, juniors, sophomores, and freshmen.

Open House will get under way at 7 o'clock, and men's groups are to spend 10 minutes at each house they visit.

Debate Tour Half Over; Men Head for China, Then Home

CALCUTTA, India, Sept. 19.—(By air mail to the Emerald)—Three weeks of fast traveling through India, three weeks of extremely hot weather, are over for the members of the University of Oregon Pacific Basin Debate Tour, Roger Alton Pfaff, David G. Wilson and the writer, as we sail tonight on the S. S. Yuen Sang for Singapore and Hongkong, western bound on the return trip to Oregon.

Our seven months' tour is now half-over, and we will return to mortgage our futures by paying the winter-term registration fees. Since our last letter from Lucknow, we have seen Indian student life at its best, with visits to the universities of Allahabad, Benares, and Calcutta. The officers of the Student Union at Allahabad university proved to be the most wide-awake and efficient hosts we have had during our Indian tour. The 1928 visit of the Oregon Round-the-World debate team to Allahabad was still remembered, and they entertained us elaborately. A crowd of 2500 filled the university's biggest hall to hear the debate on disarmament, which ended in a most unusual fashion, for the leader of the Allahabad team turned his rebuttal into a short statement

that his team would capitulate and give up the victory without decision by judges.

Allahabad students engaged a taxi to drive us 80 miles to Benares where we visited the burning ghats along the Ganges under a sun that was fully capable of consuming bodies without the aid of fire. Another large crowd heard our debate with the team representing the Benares-Hindu university, and the vice-chancellor of the University told us it was only the third time in the history of the school that the auditorium had been filled to capacity.

The Hindu university is almost free from supervision by the British government, with the result that it is a center for revolutionary agitation among student nationalists. The team which opposed us packed their speeches on disarmament with many statements about Indian independence that were startlingly radical.

Calcutta university claims to be the second largest in the world. Its 25,000 students are excelled in numbers only by Columbia university of New York City, to the best of our knowledge.

Calcutta weather is at its worst in September, but it takes more (Continued on Page Three)

With the polls slated to open at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning one more day of campaigning is left to freshman party leaders. Both factions have been actively engaged in going after the independent vote. Annual Frosh-Rook Contest To Feature Card Stunts, Says Virg Langtry

An afternoon smoker, a mock football game between halves of the Frosh-Rook game, and entertainment features at the men's living organizations were events added to the Dad's day program on October 24 in an announcement today by Virgil Langtry, special features chairman for the weekend.

With Mac Miller acting as master of ceremonies, and Russ Cutler and Paul Washke organizing the program, the smoker gets under way at 3:00 Saturday afternoon. Tumbling and bar work, boxing, wrestling and fencing matches feature the athletic events for the smoker. To take charge of the program Langtry appointed a committee of Sandy Platt, chairman; Forrest Paxton, Neil Bush, and Walt Gray.

During the game broadcast and at luncheon the men's living organizations will entertain with special stunts and songs for the Dads. Frosh Elections Scheduled for Friday at Y Hut

FRESHMAN class elections will be held tomorrow from 9 a. m. to 3 p. m. at the Y hut. It was announced yesterday by Walt Evans, vice-president of the associated students, who is in charge of the election. Committees to take charge of the polls and to count and tabulate the ballots will be announced tomorrow, according to Evans.

University Alumni Dominate Oregon's List of Who's Who

Showing a total as great as all other higher Oregon educational institutions combined, the University of Oregon with a total of 441 leads in the number of alumni listed in the 1929-30 edition of "Who's Who in Oregon." It is announced here, where a careful compilation of education of those listed has just been completed.

Oregon should be proud of the fact that 883, or approximately one-third of the 2,833 men and women of distinction listed gained their education in higher institutions of this state, it is pointed out. Second to the University's total comes Oregon State Agricultural college, with 138, while Willamette has 114. North Pacific and Linfield come next with 76 and 24 respectively.

The state university has furnished nearly one-half, or 53 out of 119, of the business owners and managers of Oregon. Nearly two-thirds, or 30 of the 52 editors, publishers and journalists listed, come from the university. Of a total of 241 lawyers, 145 came from this institution, while 111 of physicians and doctors out of 209 are Oregon men. Fifty of the 88 educators listed are university graduates also. Out of 25 engineers listed, 11 come from the state agricultural college, where all branches of this profession are taught, and 10 graduates of the university are listed, although this institution has taught no engineering since 1914.

The non-sectarian state university has furnished as many ministers to the state as any denominational college, with the exception of Willamette, which furnished 13 to the university's five.

Out of its total 5,081 alumni, 441 or 8.6 per cent of the total are listed in the who's who. Since only one-half of one per cent of the state's population over 21 years of age is listed, the percentage of the university's alumni entered equals 17.9 times that of the percentage of adult population, the figures show.
