Oregon Hoop Squad Leaves On Five-Game Trip; First Game With Idaho Tonight

10 Men Make Up Invaders; W. S. C. and Gonzaga Also To Be Met

Ten Webfoot hoopers left yesterday on a trip that will carry them through three states playing their first conference games of the present season. The Oregon five meets the Idaho Vandals tonight at Moscow in the initial contest. Four more games will be played before the varsity men return to the campus. They meet Idaho again tomorrow night and then travel to Pullman where they meet W. S. C. in two games Monday and Tuesday night. Gonzaga plays host to Reinhardt's squad in the fifth and last game of the tour in Spokane on Wednesday night.

The men who made the trip are Captain Winsor Calkins, Hank Levoff, and Charles Wishard, guards; Cap Roberts and Homer Stahl, centers; and Jack Robertson, Jim Watts, Max Rubenstein, Gib Olinger, and Cliff Potter, forwards. Those who will probably get the call in the opening line up are Calkins, Levoff, Roberts, Jack Robertson, and Watts.

Idaho has a much improved entry in the conference race this year, and the Oregon quintet will have its hands full keeping the Vandals in check.

Webfoots Lack Experience

The Webfoot squad is made up mostly of inexperienced men, and although their early season games have proven that they can play basketball, their inexperience will handicap them with the veteran Vandals and Cougars. The latter team is composed of young giants, none less than six feet tall, led by Center Huntley Gordon, the conference high scoring ace last season.

Captain Calkins has been playing good, steady ball during early season games and can always be counted upon to carry his share of the attack. Robertson and Olinger, both new men, have shown surprisingly good ball in early games. Both have proven to be good point getters, and have shown more floor-covering ability than their experience would justify. Hank Levoff and Cap Roberts are other veterans who can always be counted upon to play a consistent game.

Max Rubenstein was carried over from the reserves of last year, and has been playing a good brand of ball. Watts, Wishard, Stahl, and Potter are all inexperienced, but have been improving with each practice.

The absence of Dolp, Keenan, and Stevens, mainstays of last year's squad, from the Webfoot line up, makes the outlook for the trip decidedly pessimistic since the Vandals and Cougars are well equipped with returning lettermen plus considerable sophomore talent. The 1931 yearling squad contributed but one possible regular, Jim Watts, to Reinhardt's varsity machine.

Callison Still Undecided On Starting Five

Pivot Position Puzzles Frosh Coach

Yearlings in Hard Fight For Positions on Hoop Squad

With the first scheduled game only a week hence, Coach "Prink" Callison is experimenting to find a winning combination for his frosh basketball five. The past week has been devoted to scrimmages and, as yet, no definite decision has been reached in regard to a starting quintet.

Callison's chief trouble lies in the pivot position. When big Ted Hansen failed to return to school this term he left a hole at center that will be hard for any of the candidates turning out now to fill. Bob Miller, Sylvan Camp, and Wayne Jameson have been working in this position, and all show promise of developing into first rate pivot men but all lack height.

Guards Are Good

In the guard positions the squad is a little better fortified. Joe Walsh was lost at the end of the term because of a bad knee, but in his place will be Ralph Terjeson, Roland Rourke, Stan Kostka, Bill Berg, and J. B. McClain. The former two will probably get the call in earlier games as they have both been showing a fine brand of ball in practice. Terjeson is a good, steady player and can always be counted upon for a good game. Rourke, Kostka, Berg, and McClain are all big, fast fellows and have shown defensive ability.

A host of forwards have been reporting, but it looks as if the choice will lie among Chuck Clay, Arne Lindgren, Wilson Siegmund, and Ralph Thomas. All of these boys are stellar offensive players. Lindgren, who played for the state champion, Astoria five two years ago as a center but has been made over into a guard this season because of the height of Grenier and Parks. Ed Lacey and Horton Herman, another sophomore, shown brightly in the Montana affair and will see action while the Webfoots are in this city.

Squad in Good Shape

The entire squad is in perfect physical condition except for a few sore muscles due to the rest over the Christmas vacation but in a week these should all be eliminated, and the yearlings will be at their full strength to play the Salem high five Friday evening at McArthur court.

Vandals Preparing for Webfoot Onslaught

Wicks To Lead Attack for Fox's Hoopsters at Moscow Tonight

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Jan. 7.—(Special to the Emerald.)—Planning to get off to a flying start in the race for honors in the northern division of the Pacific Coast conference, the Idaho basketball squad anxiously awaits the opening of the first contest of the season against the University of Oregon tonight.

After showing up much better than was expected in the pre-season series and with the return of the high-scoring veteran forward, Pete Wicks, to the lineup the Vandals are in line to topple the visiting Webfoots. When Wicks, who had been on the injured list during the first non-conference tilt, took his old post, the whole outfit took on a new life and functioned in effective style.

Grenier May Start
Stan Hale, another seasoned performer, is also making his bid for a regular berth after being on the injured list. Hale's playing in the last games makes him a probable starter in the tussle tonight, although the official lineup has not been divulged.

It is likely that Howard Grenier will get the call over Ken Parks for the tip-off job. Grenier, a sophomore, has starred in many of the preliminary frays due to his scoring ability. Parks, although a letterman, is having a tough time keeping up with his inexperienced rival.

"Skinny" Nelson grabbed off honors in the Ellensburg normal contest with 24 points in the two games and will be in the fight this evening without a doubt.

Oregon Scorers Feared
After a year's absence from basketball competition, Ed Hurley is fighting hard for a place on the starting five. He played two years ago as a center but has been made over into a guard this season because of the height of Grenier and Parks. Ed Lacey and Horton Herman, another sophomore, shown brightly in the Montana affair and will see action while the Webfoots are in this city.

While the strength of the Oregon quint is not known, it is believed here that Idaho will have a good chance to start off the season with figures in the win column. Coach Fox, however, is planning his defense to take care of Bill Reinhardt's scoring threats, Calkins, Roberts, and Robertson.

IN THE PRESS BOX With Estill Phipps

The varsity basketball season for the northern branch of the Pacific coast hoop gets under way tonight. The outcome of the first sessions will give the so-called experts and indulgent rail-birds all over the Northwest a chance to talk about something tangible instead of making wild predictions as to the relative strength of the various squads.

Coach Bill Reinhardt will get his initial opportunity to see his 1932 edition under the fire of collegiate competition when his Pioneers (or Webfoots as some of the elite are wont to call them) tangle with "Rich" Fox's Idaho outfit in Moscow for the next two evenings.

From the looks of the men on the Vandal roster it appears that things should be plenty tough for the Oregon representatives. Such men as Wicks, Hale, Hall, Auckett, Barrett, Lacey, Parks plus the newly acquired services of Hurley, another returning letterman of the team of two years ago, and sophomores in the personages of Herman, Grenier and Geraghty are some of the men who will test the mettle of the Oregon five.

As we look over the layout which Coach Fox has so carefully planned for the Reinhardt reception the only man missing from last year's combination is Drummond, who was the team's captain.

After seeing the Oregon quint in action the last few days, there is a great deal of room for speculation as to what the road trip holds in the way of possibilities for the victories to adorn the win column.

Idaho with its two tall centers should be able to get the tip-off without much trouble. Parks stretches out to the six foot-seven mark while the comparatively inexperienced Grenier, who is making things hot for Parks in this first year with the varsity, is a mere six-five in his bedroom slippers.

This advantage is almost too great for Cap Roberts and Chuck Wishard, the Oregon pivot men, to battle successfully.

Reinhardt's charges had plenty of trouble holding down Hale, Auckett, and Barrett last season, so offhand it seems the Vandals' chances of beating the visiting aggregation are decidedly possible.

Oregon was anything but impressive in scrimmage against DeNeff's five the other night at practice. Jean Eberhart, Scott Milligan, and Cliff Horner, who spend their spare moments tossing the casaba for the downtown clothing establishment, crossed the Webfoot defense time and again, and on frequent occasions broke into the clear and ambled unhampered for easy cripple shots.

The session was marked by a lack of spark on the part of the varsity and only the Inland Empire trip will show whether or not there is any fire in the Oregon attack.

Captain Calkins and Hank Levoff, two-stripe men, together with Cap Roberts, one-letter winner, comprise the only experienced men on the 1932 machine. The rest of the squad is made up of men who have seen little or no combat in intercollegiate circles. While the possibilities of finishing anywhere near the top in the league are none too promising, Reinhardt's squad is sure to improve greatly during the season.

This road trip is very likely to prove rather disastrous for the Webfoots. Oregon will pull the biggest upset in a long time if it is able to win even one game from Washington State next week. The Cougars are rated along with Hec Edmundson's Huskies as the cream of the conference.

Our prediction is that Reinhardt's crew will drop both tilts to W. S. C. but should break even with Idaho. As far as the contests with Gonzaga are concerned, the Bulldogs are an unknown quantity, but are placed about in the class with Idaho.

Oregon State opens in Seattle against Washington tonight also. Coach Amory T. Gill is suffering the same handicap as is Reinhardt in having only a few seasoned performers around which to build a winning outfit. Ken Fagans, the sensational all-coast guard of last

year, the lanky Ed Lewis, Howard Merrill, and Jerry Thomas are Gill's only veterans. Fagans should have another great year, and if Lewis should shake the injury jinx which casts its shadow over him so much of the time, the Beavers should cause trouble.

The case filed by Harold McKenzie, former Bearcat guard who was chosen on the all-Northwest conference team in 1927, in circuit court here yesterday should be a choice dish for Mr. Butler if he could only get a hand in the deal.

McKenzie played on the Oregon normal eleven this fall and attracted the attention of local fans in the Oregon game by making about half of the tackles which downed the Webfoot ball-carriers. The case should prove interesting as a matter of discussion for those who are leading the fight against the subsidization of athletics, and crusaders of amateurism may be able to secure open confirmation that proselytizing is being concealed by athletic officials and college heads.

Roy "Spec" Keene, director of the athletic destiny of the Salem school, made a statement to the effect that he vaguely recalled having such a man as McKenzie on this football team.

How wonderful must be the glory of noble achievement on the gridiron when three years later the coach has difficulty in remembering one of his former players who was picked on mythical all-star selections.

New Psychology Leaflet Just Off University Press

Symposium of Experiments by Professor, Student Given

Another of the University publication pamphlets of the psychology series has just been published by the University press and is ready for release.

The contents of this third number of the psychology series concerns the objective measurements of emotion in which a symposium of three experimental papers by Harold R. Crosland, associate professor in psychology, and Lester Beck, graduate student of last year who is at present on a scholarship at Brown university, Providence, Rhode Island, where he is working for his Ph.D. in psychology, is given.

These pamphlets are published quarterly by the University and the series is offered in exchange for the publications of learned societies and institutions, universities, and libraries.

The various series are grouped under business administration, education, geology, journalism, language and literature, mathematics, physical education, plant biology, psychology, and the humanities series.

Error in Emerald Relief Fund Story Omits \$3500

Faculty Members To Contribute \$10,000 Instead of \$6,500

In connection with the story in yesterday morning's Emerald concerning the governor's relief program which will help worthy students on the campus, a correction is to be made about the total sum contributed by the faculty of the University.

The story stated that \$6,500 would be contributed by the faculty members but altogether for the five winter months \$10,000 will make the sum, of which \$6,500 will go to the Lane county relief fund and \$3,500 to the state. The \$250 received by the University for relief on the campus from the governor's committee was taken from the funds contributed by the faculty here at Oregon.

Social Lassitude In Improvements To Be Discussed

YM Study Group Arranges Series of Analytical Problem Talks

Patterns of social behavior and the lag of their development in relation to the progress of physical science and economic organization are to be discussed in the Y. W. C. A. winter term study group which will meet each Thursday from 7:30 to 8:30 starting January 14.

"We are assuming that mechanization of industry, universal communication, the scientific temper of mind, and secularization of life are creating a civilization so different in many essentials as to make older approaches to it inadequate. We are calling this recent development in methods of physical existence the 'New Civilization,'" said R. B. Porter, secretary of the Y, in explaining the purpose of the series.

Faculty To Speak
Members of the University faculty who are specialists in their fields will present their own personal opinions on the position of certain phases of social life.

Philip A. Parsons, dean of the school of applied social science, will open the series, according to Donald Saunders, chairman of discussion groups. He will talk on the subject, "How Is the New Civilization Different?" Dean Parsons will also lead a later group on "Religion for the New Civilization."

"Economic Organization for the New Civilization" is to be presented by Jesse H. Bond, professor of business administration, on January 21.

Morality Is Topic
Dean Karl W. Onthank will present his views on "The Family and Morality." "Nationalism in the New Civilization" will be taken by Dr. John R. Mez.

Harry W. Laidler, national representative of the League for Industrial Democracy and author of the book, "How America Lives," will be on the campus February 11, and an effort is being made to secure him for the subject, "Politics in the New Civilization," which is scheduled for that date.

Discussions on education and art will complete the series of eight studies. Leaders for these will be announced soon, Saunders said.

Visibility to the east along 13th avenue will be increased for motorists driving down University street from the south as workmen are cutting down the trees and digging up the high private hedge at that place preparatory to lowering the lot to street level.
