Vikings Out For Revenge After Defeat

Huntington's Team Has Strong Defense

Injuries Handicap Frosh; Starting Line-up Changed

The Red and Black hoopsters of Salem high clash with "Prink" Callison's freshman five at the Igloo tonight at 7:30. The Vikings are "out for blood" in this contest as the frosh took an 18 to 10 decision from them on their home court last Saturday.

Hollis Huntington, coach of the capital city aggregation, brings a strong squad for the tilt. Sanford, all-state guard for the last two years, will lead the invaders. He is backed by a squad of veterans, many of whom played on last year's stellar Salem team which battled its way to the state finals only to lose to Pendleton in an over-time game, 31 to 29.

Salem Defense Strong
The frosh, with two wins to their credit so far this year, will endeavor to keep their slate clean with a second win over the Vikings. The local boys will not soon forget the close call they had at Salem last week, and Callison has been drilling his squad in an effort to overcome the strong Salem defense which held the Ducks to eight field goals in this tilt.

The Salem team uses the zone defense. This fact has forced Callison to change his offense considerably, and he has had his men working against this type of play all week. The Vikings are particularly adept in this style of guarding and are considered to be one of the best defensive teams in the state.

Frosh Line-up Changed

With injuries taking heavy toll on his starting line-up, Coach Callison has been forced to change his regular combination time and again during the last few practice sessions. Sylvan Camp and Arne Lindgren will probably start in the forward positions. These two men have been consistent point-getters all year, the former scoring 12 of the 18 points counted against Salem last Saturday.

Ralph Terjesen will likely start at a guard. The other position was left open with the injury of Roland Rourke in Wednesday night's practice, but his berth will be filled by either Bill Berg, Ralph Thomas, or J. B. McClain, all of whom have been doing good work. Bob Miller will probably see action at center. The game will start promptly at 7:30. There will be no charge for admission.

MUELLER TRACES PHASE OF RUSSIAN STANDARDS

The virtues subscribed to by the Communists include obedience, cleanliness, modesty, loyalty, and anti-religion, according to Professor Mueller.

He outlined Russia's contacts with other nations, explaining that Russia fears an encirclement, as Germany is the only nation upon which she can depend for support. "Complete disarmament of all nations is Russia's desire, for she has everything to gain and nothing to lose. She needs to conserve her economic resources, but under present circumstances her psychology is a war psychology."

"Thus, anyone who is anti-Bolshevik is a spy. And the Russians believe that within ten years they will have to fight the world. However, they would rather see the nations fight among themselves, with Russia reaping the economic benefit which the United States derived from the early years of the World war."

One would think that Oregon basketball would be a tough one to write about since the boys took a 20-point beating from the Idaho Vandals last Tuesday night. It is not in the least. The club's every bit as good right now as the crowd saw them Monday night.

They haven't any particular alibi. It was just basketball. Talking to Rich Fox, Idaho's coach, after the game I gathered that it wasn't any great surprise to him to see his squad come out of the hole after losing four straight games. "The boys have just hit their stride, that's all," he said. "I've been expecting something like this to happen all season because my boys have the stuff it takes. Tonight's game is just a starter and from now on we're going to make it hot for the rest of them." I hope he's right because Idaho's had its share of the tough breaks the past couple of years and if they go at it like they did Tuesday, there may be a new cast to the outlook for conference honors.

Washington meets Oregon State this week-end at Corvallis. That will be interesting—the league leaders, O. S. C., and the would-be and doped leaders, Washington. Should the Huskies win two over there, the conference will be in another close jumble because we have a sneaking suspicion that Idaho is just about good enough to knock off Washington State and put things on a more even keel as the season goes into the fourth week. Of course we may be far off the mark, but that's the way we'd like to see things happen.

Aside from that Oregon won't start the basketball schedule until Monday night in a two-game series against the University of Washington. Here's another team that's going to be hard to beat—last year's Coast champions and this year's big bet to win, again, earlier in the season. They'll be bringing along Swygard, Nelson, and Fuller of last year's squad, and Pete Antonich, a converted football end, at center, to try and work off a little ire caused by their 27-point licking from the Cougars last week. Yes, here's another series that will bear watching.

In fact, all the games left to be played in Eugene will be just about everything that you could wish for in the way of fast-moving action and heads-up basketball. So far, the conference title is anybody's. Oregon and O. S. C. always put up four of the tightest games of the entire sked and this year's series is no exception with both teams looking about on a par.

The W. S. C. series is my guess to be the thriller. They have everything up there and a couple of uncanny sharpshooters in Holsten and Cross that prove plenty of worry to any squad. Oregon broke even when they met in Pullman and it will be nip and tuck down here, also. We saw those two games up North and both of them were naturals. The four Oregon regulars, Cap Roberts, who incidentally at the present time is the leading conference scorer; Captain Windy Calkins, Hank Levoff, and Spook Robertson all turned in spectacular ball games and are out to repeat. Yes, we'd say that all the basketball to be played at McArthur court for the rest of the year will be top-notch.
