Long Shots Too Much for Viking Five

Berg Leads Scoring With Ten Pints

Burrell and Sanford Head Attack of Red And Black

The Oregon freshman basketball squad ran its string of victories to three last night when it defeated the Vikings of Salem high for the second time this season by a score of 31 to 19.

Callison's charges played a slow, deliberate game, making most of their field goals on long shots over the Red and Black defense. The frosh tried blocking plays during the first period of the game, but finding that they couldn't work the ball past the tight Salem defense, they began putting them in from beyond the foul line.

Game Starts Slow
The game started out slow with neither team being able to penetrate the other's defense for a score. Sanford, Salem's stellar guard opened the scoring with a free throw. Before the freshman could open up with their attack, Kelly, the little southpaw forward

of the Vikings, dropped a one-handed shot through the hoop to make it 3 to 0.
Bill Berg, who started his first game for the frosh tonight, opened up the long shot and immediately followed it with another to put the Ducks in the lead. From that time on the game was in favor of the local squad.

Rourke Scores
Rourke, regular guard, who played most of the game despite a sprained ankle received in practice last week, gave his team a commanding lead at half time with three long, arching shots from near the center of the floor. The scored favored the frosh 14 to 7 at the half.

Berg, freshman guard, was the leading scorer of the game with 10 points. Burrell, Salem center, led the attack of the invaders. He left the game with four personal fouls in the third quarter, but still managed to account for seven points.

Oregon Law Review Goes To Printer's Hands Today

Articles by Law Professors Have Prominent Place

The February issue of the Oregon Law Review, quarterly publication of the law school and the state bar association, will be in the hands of printers today, Charles G. Howard, editor-in-chief, announced yesterday. It will be off the press February 15.

Centering around two main articles by law faculty members, this issue contains three book reviews, an editorial by James W. Crawford, president of the bar association, and numerous notes, recent cases, and articles written by law students under the scrutiny of William Kuykendall, student editor-in-chief.

"Tort Liability of Municipalities in Oregon," an article by Dr. James D. Barnett, is a study of tort liabilities in the Oregon law.

Prof. Howard's article, "The restatement of the law of contracts with Oregon cases," continued from previous issues of the Review, is a comparative study of the law in over 300 cases concerning the law of consideration of contracts in Oregon with American Law Institute restatements of common law of contracts. This study has been commended by numerous judges, justices, and attorneys throughout the Northwest.
