

Wskins Will Describe Artic Submarine Trip Wednesday

Diving beneath Arctic ice floes—sailing smoothly through the depth of Polar seas with the weirdly beautiful floor of the Arctic visible above—tossing helplessly about on the surface amid shifting floes, with his ship, the Nautilus, rudderless and unable to dive below were some of the experiences of Sir Hubert Wilkins, noted Polar explorer, and his band of scientists on their bold attempt to reach the North Pole. Motion pictures recording every important happening on the expedition will be shown when Wilkins makes his appearance in McArthur court next Wednesday evening, with the explorer, himself, describing the incidents.

The expedition penetrated to within 450 miles of the pole to prove that Wilkins' ideas of submarine travel through the polar regions was practical. Through the general public considers the courageous explorer beaten, the infor-

mation he gathered on the voyage of the Nautilus has made him certain that he can now build a craft that will be suitable for extended dives under the ice.

Wilkins, who has devoted his life to polar exploration, used dog sleds and airplanes on his previous expeditions but he recently declared that the submarine was the best means of transportation for this type of work.

Much interest has been evinced in the appearance of Wilkins at McArthur court and all indications point to a large attendance at his lecture. The prices announced for the event are 50 cents for seats in the center sections and 25 cents for seats in the side sections. As the lecture is not a regular feature on the student concert series, and is therefore not included in the student body fees, a charge of 25 cents will be made for students attending the event.

The executive council of this league consists of some of the foremost authorities in national and international relations. It includes such men as Charles Dawes, George Wickersham, Frank Lowden, Lawrence Lowell, Nicholas Murray Butler, Harry Garfield, James A. Angell, and Silas Strawn.

With the purpose of this league carried out it unites the best men in all sections of the country in an effort to secure a consensus of opinion as to which are the most important current problems and to analyze their solution. Its object is to educate and crystallize public sentiment and to make such public sentiment an effective force for good.

Miss Brockman will play the Mozart Concerto in E-flat for violin and orchestra. The sparkle and life of this selection, while it shows Mozart in his classic fineness, also brings out that side of his music which marks him as a showman.

Howard Halbert will play the violin solo part of the "Symphonie Espagnole" by Edouard Lalo, and will also be accompanied by the orchestra. This selection is a direct contrast to Mozart's work. Mozart is a classicist, while the "Symphonie Espagnole" is distinctly modern and descriptive in its idioms.

The program begins at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon. Students will be admitted for 15 cents; faculty and townspeople for 25 cents.

In response to a request from the Oregon chapter of Sigma Delta Pi, Spanish national honorary, Professor John Stark Evans has included in his program for the coming Sunday twilight organ recital a group of Spanish pieces. The newly chosen members of the honorary, Barbara Leiter and J. Ladrew Moshberger, are to assist with the ushering.

Two of the Spanish numbers are by Spaniards, and two by Spanish-Americans. Granados, whose Spanish dance, "La Playera," is to be played, was the composer who was drowned when the ill-fated Sussex went down in the English channel during the World war. Isaac Albeniz is a contemporary musician, whose "Cordova" is well known for its interweaving of Spanish and Moorish themes. "A la Orilla de un Palmar" is

a typical Mexican folksong, which suggests the strumming instrument, and the duet, "Adios mi Chaparrita," which is a characteristic country folksong from the region near Guadalajara, has become better known in the United States since it was reprinted and sent as a token of friendship to the children of this country from those of Mexico, the latter paying for all the expenses by contributing a centavo per student throughout the country.
