

Come on, Cap! Gordon Gains More Protests

BOTH from an individual and collective standpoint, Oregon's basketball situation became more acute over the week-end. That double loss to Washington was disastrous in more ways than one. Not only were the Webfoots' chances of finishing at or above the .500 per cent reduced to a bare minimum, but Cap Roberts' once firm grip on the individual scoring lead was shaken to a mere handhold.

In the two games against the Huskies, Roberts contributed only eight points, six of them in the first encounter. This brings his total to date to 84, an average of slightly better than 7 1-2 points a game. Second to Roberts and coming on like a column of cavalry is Huntly Gordon of Washington State college. While Roberts was suffering at the hands of the Huskies, Gordon waded through Oregon State for 22 tallies in a two-game series at Pullman. Both conflicts, incidentally, were taken by the Cougars, who appear virtual certainties to win the northern division championship.

Gordon's scoring spree lofted his total to 77 points. Thus he still is seven markers back of Roberts. There's a fly in the ointment, however, and it's a big one. Roberts has participated in 11 conference games thus far and Gordon has played in only nine. The lanky Washington State tipoff man has an ace up his sleeve in those extra two games. If past production is any indication, they should give him ample opportunity in which to overhaul Roberts. Gordon's per game average at present is almost exactly one point better than that of Cap.

Captain Winsor Calkins of Oregon enjoyed his week-end at Seattle more than Roberts and elevated his scoring total to 75. He contributed 15 points in the two games. He is five tallies ahead of Claud Holsten, Washington State, who holds a commanding advantage

That's one reason why Chuck Carroll's All-American exhibition when the 1928 Washington football eleven was losing all its major games was so remarkable. The same is true of Wesley Ferrell, the slender southpaw pitcher who won more than 20 games with the fourth-place Cleveland Indians at his back.

Despite their early elimination as championship contenders, Oregon's basketball lads haven't done so badly considering everything. They licked Oregon State once and so far are the only group to have the distinction of overcoming Washington State's Cougars. Because he has worked all season with untried material, Bill Reinhart has done wonders with the Oregon team.

Even the Olympic games aren't free from protests. Several days ago the ice-skating preliminaries at Lake Placid had to be re-run because a group of competing nations complained about certain discrepancies on the arrangements, etc. Thus modern inconveniences invade even the staid old Olympic games. Certainly, protests were unheard of 24 centuries ago when Pheidippides, the original long-distance runner of them all, made his epic dash over the hills from Marathon to tell the Greeks that Athens was saved.

The Persians neither made any attempt to have Pheidippides disqualified, nor were protests filed with Judge Kenasaw Mountain Landis, Avery Brundage or Commissioner Jonathan Butler. As a matter of fact, small good they would have done. That was one race that could not be re-run. Pheidippides died as he gasped the good news in the market-place at Athens.

It looks like Southern California will win the basketball race in the South. Thus far the Trojans have encountered serious opposition only from the California Bears. Stanford started like a whirlwind, won its first two games, then collapsed completely. The Cards are in the cellar now.

Oregon Yearlings Get Big Score in Second Game Of Series

Duplicating their feat of Friday night the frosh turned back Roy Lamb's O. S. C. rooks at Corvallis Saturday afternoon. The final count was 32 to 30. The Oregon yearlings led 3 to 12 at the half.

As in the Friday night contest, which the frosh won 40 to 20, the Beaver yearlings gained an early lead. Within ten minutes of play gone the score stood 8 to 3 in favor of the Corvallis team. Captain Berg and Bob Miller then counted with three field goals for the Ducklings and the Eugene team was never again headed.

With but ten minutes to go in the final period, the frosh held a 12-point advantage, but George Hibbard, flashy rook captain and guard, dropped in three field goals in quick succession and added two free throws to give the Orange team a much better chance to overcome the leaders. By clever ball handling, however, the Oregon freshmen were able to hold on to a two-point lead until the final gun barked.

"American Commitments in the Pacific" will be the subject for a 15-minute talk by Dr. Harold J. Noble, of the history department, during the Emerald of the Air this afternoon at 4:15. Discussions of the present Sino-Japanese hostilities and the part America plays in the situation, Dr. Noble says, usually do not bring up certain pertinent treaties to which the United States is a party. In his talk, Dr. Noble will point these agreements out, and the part they are playing in Pacific diplomacy.

Richard Shore Smith, former University of Oregon football coach and now president of First National bank of Eugene, was named by President Hoover yesterday as one of the men on the board which will administer the \$2,000,000 Reconstruction Finance corporation. This corporation was planned by President Hoover for working out the restoration of credit in the United States.

Mr. Smith took over the controls of Oregon's football machine at the resignation of Joe Maddock, a Michigan man, who was coach in 1924, and remained for the 1925 season only. Mr. Smith received recognition in the pigskin sport when he was selected on Walter Camp's all-American team in 1903 while playing at Columbia university. He also played at the University of Oregon before going to the eastern university.

Sir Norman Angell, British statesman, asserted recently that the depression was not so much the result of natural causes as it was the failure of man properly to educate himself.

At present the Cougars, led by Huntley Gordon and Claud Holsten, are firmly entrenched in first place by a wide margin. They have won eight and lost one game for a percentage of .889. Washington is second with six and four or a .600 percentage. Oregon State's two defeats at the hands of the Cougars while the Huskies were drubbing Oregon lowered it to third place. Oregon and Idaho are at the bottom.

Washington State makes its first swing into the south this week. Friday and Saturday the Cougars meet Oregon at McArthur court and the following Monday and Tuesday face O. S. C. at Corvallis.

Southern California increased its lead in the southern division race by trouncing Stanford twice. Jerry Nemer, Trojan ace, practically won both games single handed. He scored 21 points the first night and 15 the second.

California remains a serious threat to the Trojans. They are only one game behind the Trojans. Two victories over U. C. L. A. put them up in the conference standings.

This week-end the Bears meet Stanford in what should be an easy victory, while the Trojans take on the scrappy Bruins.

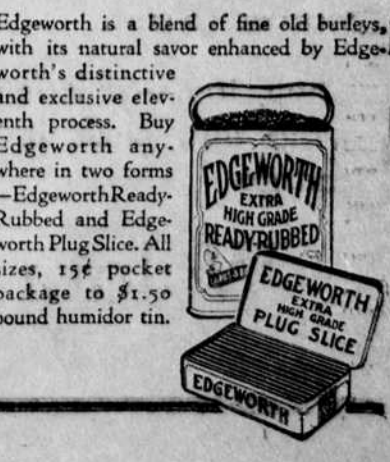
