

Carry On. Kitz Helps Out. Practice Starts.

ONE SWALLOW doesn't make a summer, nor does the employment of one man make or break the athletic destinies of a university. Losing Doc Spears was a bitter disappointment to Oregon, but there's only one thing to do and that's to "carry on." There's no use becoming discouraged over the situation. That would be fatal at this late stage of the game. If everybody pitches in and looks at the thing from its proper perspective, there'll be no confusion at all.

It has not yet been decided whether a local man will be selected to fill the vacant post or whether an outsider will be employed. At present Bill Reinhart and Frank Callison appear to be the staff members favored by the campus and downtown critics. Both are noteworthy candidates. Another man not to be overlooked as a staff member is Jack O'Brien. Regardless of whether Reinhart or Callison or an outside applicant gets the position, Jack O'Brien would be a valuable addition to the coaching corps. He is a fine personality and unexcelled as a scout of opposing elevens.

The new coach, whoever he may be, will step into a man's sized job when he takes over the post Doc Spears filled so capably for two years. It will be a long time before Doc Spears is forgotten here. His teams played outstanding football and played it well. The thrill Oregon got when the news of Doc's conquest of New York university flashed over the wires was a memorable one. But because Doc Spears' successor faces a hard task, the University must be behind him to a man.

The schedule for this autumn is a tough one—Oregon plays five conference games and three non-conference encounters of big-league caliber. It will take a well-coached team to combat that schedule with any degree of success. Given a reasonable amount of support, the 1932 football team should go a long ways. Spring football practice started with renewed vigor yesterday, and there will be more lads out before many days pass by.

At each tick of the clock Oregon gets nearer to the start of the actual season, so there should be no delay in getting plans for this fall under way.

Cooperation is what Oregon needs and that's what it received from Johnny Kitzmiller yesterday, when the dashing halfback of two years ago slipped on a uniform and helped Jack O'Brien get spring

Colonel Bill Hayward went about his business yesterday just as if nothing had happened. The colonel has been head trainer for more than a dozen coaches here, all of them his personal friends, so such an event is nothing new to him. He spent yesterday afternoon working his trackmen on Hayward field. Incidentally, Bill's highly valuable services as a trainer also are at the disposal of the new coach, something the new mentor certainly should not overlook.

Because Spears was a physician as well as a coach, he and Hayward worked unusually well together in the training department. Along with young Bob Officer, who acted as the colonel's assistant, they had a medical room established at McArthur court that cared for everything from sprained ankles to broken teeth.

Yesterday also was a day of work for Bill Reinhart. He had the baseball nine working out in McArthur court. Incidentally, the club was crippled temporarily when Leland Chester, veteran infielder, sprained an ankle, and probably will be out of action until the regular season starts.

Callison will start freshman baseball practice this week also.

To get back to the football situation, there's more reason than ever why the entire athletic department should work as a unit now. If either Reinhart or Callison is advanced, there undoubtedly will be vacancies in the freshman and basketball and baseball departments which will have to be filled. However, Hugh Kosson says nothing will be done about these jobs until a new head coach is selected.

Track Hopes Are Dark for 1932 Season

Many Stars Lost From Last Year's Squad

Colonel Bill Hayward Drills Athletes for Meet With O. S. C., April 23

With the first scheduled competition now less than a month away, Colonel Bill Hayward, veteran track mentor, is beginning to weed out the athletes who will represent Oregon on the track and field this year. With but eight lettermen returning, and scant new material developing, Oregon's chances on the cinders this spring are not bright.

Hayward is rich in sprinters. Paul Starr, track captain, and Paul Bale are the mainstays in the shorter dashes. Both are lettermen and are fast enough to hold their own in competition. In the 440-yard dash four speedsters have been looking good in early tryouts. John Marrs, Art Holman, Chuck Dolfio, and Jack Rollway, who composed the track Webfoot mile relay team last year, are all back and have turned in some fast times so far this year.

In the longer runs the outlook is not so bright. Tom Moran, a last year's letterman, leads all of the half milers. Moran is good at this distance, and should garner his share of first and second places.

With the loss of Ralph Hill and Bob Hall in the distances, Hayward will be considerably handicapped. Bob Hunter, a new man, transferred from Stanford, will be the one hope in the mile.

In the hurdles two veterans, Allen and Holman, will bear the burden of the competition for the season. Mason McCoy, a sophomore flash, has been turning in good times in the high sticks and should be good for a place in most meets.

In the field events there are few promising candidates, and all of the honors the Oregon squad gains this spring will undoubtedly be through the victories of her stars on the track.

Outstanding men in every field event were lost, and as yet Coach Hayward has found no one to fill in the vacancies of such stars as Bobby Robinson, pole vault ace, and big Ed Moeller, discus champion.

In the shot put and discus throw the leading contenders for places on the squad are Marion Hall and Alton Hakanson.

Bill "Iron Man" Palmer, El Edwards, and Jack Rushlow have been working out with the javelin. Palmer and Edwards are lettermen. Palmer is also a dependable performer in the broad jump and the high jump. Hubert Allen is another letterman who can be counted on in the broad jump.

No pole vaulters have shown outstanding ability to date although a number of ambitious athletes have been working out daily for this event. Among those who have shown the best results are Voegtli and McCoy.

April 23 the Oregon squad meets Oregon State's athletes in the annual relays between the two schools. The meet will be held at Eugene.

Tribute to Knute Rockne Starts Spring Practice

Notre Dame Grid Turnout Totals 250 Strong; Prospects Good

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Mar. 31. (AP)—Knute Rockne's spirit marched today, the first anniversary of his death.

Memorial services were held after which his successor as head football coach, Hearty Anderson, assembled Notre Dame's 1932 football army, 250 strong, for the first spring practice.

Today's practice marked the beginning of full control of the team and its destinies by Anderson. A year ago, when the university still reeled under the shock of Rockne's death in an airplane crash on a Kansas hillside, no selection was made but later Anderson was named "senior" coach and Jack Chevigny, "junior" coach. The arrangement was unsatisfactory to both coaches.

Today Anderson was surrounded by assistants of his own selection—three of them stars from his 1931 machine, Marcy Schwartz, Nurdy Hoffman and former Captain Tom Yarr. Schwartz was in charge of the backfield, Hoffman and Yarr drilled the line, while Ike Voedsch, the only holdover from last season's coaching ranks, was back as end mentor.

"Prospects are good," Anderson said.

Southpaw Twirler Needed To Round Out Bill Reinhart's Nine

The 1932 edition of Oregon's entry in the annual Northwest chase for baseball honors is now in the making. Despite the loss of a number of last year's stars, the talent displayed on the practice field looks fairly promising.

The strength of this year's diamond aggregation will lie in the infield. There are lettermen returning for each position, and these will have a difficult time gaining a place in the first-string line-up in the face of the large number of last season's frosh stars working out. The quartet of lettermen are Chester at first, Londahl at second, Stevens at short, and Potter at third.

Harry McCall, a left-handed wonder who played with the frosh last year, is giving Chester a hard fight for the first base position. Mike Mikulak, another sophomore, has been doing well at third base.

Duke Shaneman will probably work behind the bat. He is a veteran receiver, and is a valuable hitter.

Brian Minnaugh is the only left-hander returning in the outfield. Coach Bill Reinhart has a multitude of right-handed pitchers, but what is needed most now to complete a winning combination is a good left-handed twirler. Osborne Edwards, Ken Seales, and Ike Donin will probably see most of the work in the box this season.

Oregon Student Conqueror Of Best Northwestern Sword Wielders

The northwest intercollegiate fencing champion for 1932—such is the title of a student on the Oregon campus. He is Norris Porter of Medford, sophomore in pre-law. He slashed his way through the cream of the Northwest bladesmen last week-end in a tournament in Portland.

The preliminaries of the tourney began March 24 at Reed college in the metropolis and ceased activities at the Y. M. C. A. on March 26.

In the finals it happened that each of the large northwest colleges had representatives, most of the original entrants from about thirty colleges having been eliminated in the previous matches.

Porter, in the round robin finals college, 5-3, Bower of Oregon battles, beat Pewtherer of Reed State, 5-4, and, in the very last contest, Richardson of the University of Washington, 5-3. The titlist had a close battle in his duel with Bower; the Beaver swordsman took the first four touches and needed only one more for an easy victory, but Porter came to life and tallied five contacts in a row for a win.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., March 31.—(AP)—Two world records toppled today before the onslaught of a crack field of swimmers in the national senior A. A. U. championships in the Yale pool.

George Kojac of the New York A. C. swam the 150-yard backstroke in 1 minute 37.2-5 seconds to clip 3-5 of a second from his own mark made two years ago.

Clarence (Buster) Crabbe of the Los Angeles A. C., set a new world's record to win the 800-yard medley swim. His time was 3 minutes 36.2-5 seconds, 2-5 of a second better than the old mark.
