Series Will Be Continued All This Term, Says Prof. Smith

With a number of outstanding motion pictures, selected from the best that have been produced here and abroad during the past two years, the faculty club series of cinemas will be continued on Thursday afternoons this coming term, it is announced by S. Stephenson Smith, chairman.

The first of the productions will be "Song of My Heart" in which John McCormick takes the leading role. This is distinctly a high class picture, and is declared by music critics to be the most worthwhile picture of its kind ever produced.

"Outward Bound," famous both as a stage play and a motion picture, will be next on the list. This picture is now having a great revival in New York, and is still rated by many as the greatest dramatic attempt on the talking screen.

A picture that will be seen again by many people who enjoyed it when it played at the Colonial some time ago, "Viennese Nights" will be the feature for the second Thursday. This is a delightful musical production, with a touching theme, beautifully staged in technical color.

For the fourth of the series a contest will be conducted among those interested in the cinemas. Three pictures, "Kismet," "The Letter," and "Alexander Hamilton" are available, and the one receiving the most votes will be shown.

The series last term was very

successful and is being continued at the request of many people who declare that in these pictures they found the most worthwhile in screen entertainment.

The usual three shows each matinee will be continued, and prices will be the same as last term, it is announced.

Campbell Will Go To Albany College To Talk on Peace

The contest will be held in the college chapel at 7:30 under the auspices of the Intercollegiate Forensic association of Oregon. The financial backers of the state contests are the Seabury sisters of Massachusetts. In the interest of international peace, these women offer state prizes of \$60 and \$40 to winners of first and second place, and a national prize to the two best speakers among state winners.

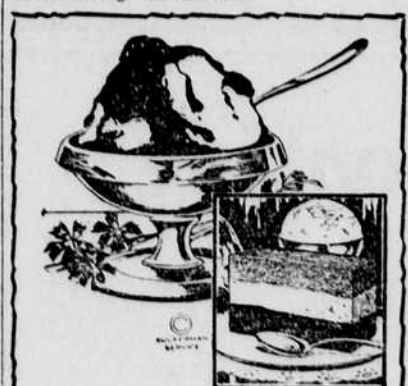
'Y' Secretary Going To Methodist Meeting

Worldwide Hunt For Lindy's Baby In Second Month

Proof of Child's Safety or Whereabouts Lacking, But Hope Lasts

HOPEWELL, N. J., March 31—(AP)—A month of searching throughout the world for the kidnapped Charles Augustus Lindbergh, Jr., had passed tonight with apparent proof of his safety and whereabouts still lacking.

Thousands of "tips" have been investigated. Automobiles in all parts of the country have been stopped on suspicion. Hundreds of houses have been searched. Many a suspect has been questioned. Babies by the dozens have been found bearing a striking resemblance to the missing boy.

Federal, state, county, city and village officers saw the month drawing to a close with their efforts still in vain. At least four underworld characters who were projected one after another into the case likewise had met no apparent success.

Hope that the blue-eyed boy may still be returned to his parents has been revived by statements of three Norfolk, Va., residents that they had made contacts with the kidnapers. But in spite of two airplane trips by the Virginians and two conferences with Colonel Lindbergh here, no indication has come from the famous flier that he looks for success from that quarter.

State police have repeatedly expressed belief there is "no specific significance" to that angle of the case and have quoted Colonel Lindbergh as saying the same thing.

Varsity Debaters Return From Trip

Four Represent Oregon at Meeting in California

Wallace Campbell, Rolla Reedy, and Hobart Wilson, Oregon varsity debaters, and John L. Casteel, director of the speech division, returned last week-end from a debate tour of California, where they represented the University at the ninth annual conference of the Pacific Forensic league, held at Pomona college, March 21, 22, and 23.

Non-decision debates with Stanford university, the University of Southern California, and the University of California at Los Angeles were scheduled. During the conference the Oregon team was awarded a 2-1 decision over a University of Arizona squad in debating the question: "Resolved, That Congress should enact legislation providing for the centralized control of industry." Monday, March 21, Reedy took part in the preliminary oratorical contest held by the league. The following day Campbell reached the finals of the annual extemporaneous speaking contest.

The Oregon student delegation is a member of the committee on the next conference, which is to be held on an Oregon campus. Willamette university, Oregon State college, and the University of Oregon are members of the league.
