Game at Corvallis To Be First for Men

Scales or Edwards Will Be Pitching Choice for Today's Tilt

With the announcement that either Ken Scales or Ossie Edwards will twirl against the Oregon State Beavers today in the first of a two-game series at Corvallis, Admiral Bill Reinhart led his walling Webfeet into the final stretch of pre-season drill yesterday. A squad of about 20 players will embark promptly at 12:30 p. m. from the Igloo for its conquest of Beaverland.

The boys are making a special effort to take the tilt as today is Admiral Reinhart's birthday. If all goes well, it should be a gala day for the Admiral.

Today's game will be the first chance for the fans to see what Reinhart really has in the line of a baseball team. The Orangemen, on the other hand, have already taken two out of three from the Willamette varsity. They won the first, 3-2, but were held to three hits in the second encounter by Andy Peterson, star hurler for the Bearcats, losing 6 to 2. The final clash proved a wild affair, the State nine finally nosing out a 20-19 victory.

The final workout saw a lightening fast infield work for part of the period, and then continue with a long batting practice. In the 440-yard relay, the frosh will be represented by Fred Nowland, Art Clarkson, Arne Lindgren, and Al Culverwell.

Art Clarkson, Wayne Jamison, Arne Lindgren, and Henry Wilkins are the four speedsters who will make up the half-mile relay squad.

Spears Slated To Get Promotion at Wisconsin School

Athletic Head Resignation Brings Former Webfoot Mentor in Spotlight

UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN, Madison, April 28.—(Special)—The appointment of Dr. Clarence Spears as director of all athletics at the University of Wisconsin seemed imminent here today. The celebrated foot ball coach, who came here from the University of Oregon several weeks ago, was in line to succeed C. W. Spears Irwin Uteritz.

Spears' promotion became a near certainty yesterday when Uteritz was transferred back to his old post as backfield coach at his own request. Following this action, university officials hinted that Spears might assume the dual role of athletic director and head football coach.

An enthusiastic welcome was accorded Spears here last night at a mammoth banquet in his honor. He has been in charge of spring football practice at Camp Randall ever since his arrival here from Eugene, Ore.

Madison Retains A.A.U. Swim Title

OLYMPIC STADIUM, Los Angeles, April 28.—(AP)—Two of the nation's leading Olympic hopes, Miss Helene Madison, of Seattle, and Miss Eleanor Holm, of New York, successfully defended their national A. A. U. indoor women's swimming titles today in the opening events of the four-day races.

Miss Holm, representing the New York women's swimming association, won the 300 yard medley test with ease, finishing ten yards ahead of her closest rival in four minutes, twenty-seven and two-tenths seconds.

The Seattle mermaid, applicant for sixteen world's records, had a close call in the 100 yard free style race, defeating Miss Josephine McKin of the Los Angeles Athletic club, by less than a foot in one minute, two and four-tenths seconds.

USC, Stanford Prepare for Annual Meet

Wykoff, Eastman Set To Stage Great Battle

Trojan-Indian Feud Slated To Open Up Again Saturday

LOS ANGELES, April 27.

Both the University of Southern California and Stanford track teams will be very near at full strength when they meet in the Olympic stadium here Saturday in their annual dual meet.

Entry lists announced today by Coaches Dean Cromwell and Dink Templeton indicated that both mentors hoped to have all of their boys who have been out with injuries back in shape for the contest which is expected to be the biggest pre-Olympic cinder-path affair of the season.

Stanford will have Les Habes, who has been out of condition due to a combination of leg and sinus trouble, back in the sprints, while Bill Miller, star pole vaulter, will be back in the lineup after a long absence. Along with their usual array of stars topped by Ben Eastman, the Indians will present an enlarged and improved squad, particularly in the distances, among the additions being Frank Fullender in the 880, Allan Storms in the mile and Paul Aebersold in the two-mile.

Southern California will have Bill Graber in the pole vault and Dick Barber in the broad jump despite their early season injuries, but the competing of John Johnson in the broad jump, Jimmy Payne in the low hurdles and Bob Reed in the relay is doubtful because of injuries sustained last week. Curtis McFadden may replace Johnson in the jump. Norman Paul will run the hurdles if Payne can not get back into condition, and Jim McNeill may take Reed's relay lap.

Jim Stewart is definitely out of the high jump as Coach Cromwell wants to give his injured leg more rest. Duncan McNaughton will jump in Stewart's place.

Barring a recurrence of his old back muscle injury, Frank Wykoff will enter both sprints, with Leslie Ball and Roy Delby his running mates. With the improvement of Delby in the 100, Alvin Koenig is shifting to the 440 and if he shows up well in final practices this week he may be used in this event against Stanford.

Pressed to the limit in a surprisingly close five-set encounter, the heavily favored California youth beat off the challenge of the Canadian champion, Dr. Jack Wright, by scores of 8-6, 3-6, 6-4, 3-6, 6-2, after Wilmer Allison, the Texan, had trimmed Marcel Rainville of Canada, 6-2, 6-4, 6-4.

Full-Length Game Slated For Practice Session of Spring Season

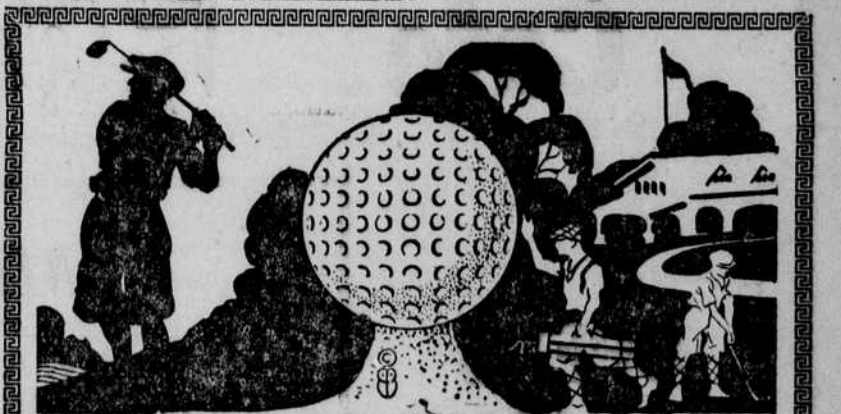
