(Continued from Tage One) cently been reading in the Journal howling for days that the house of the American Medical association how experimenters at Yale have been poisoning dogs with strychnine and then saving their lives with injections of phenobarbital, gave the rescuers a hynodermic needle full of the drug, which is called a "physiological antidote" for strychnine poisoning.

The pair rushed back to the dog and shot the phenobarbital into his shoulder, then carried him off to Dr. L. G. Helterline, veterinary, at 1117 West Eleventh street.

Doctor Helterline examined the dog and announced that the dog had not been poisoned, but was suffering from coreah, a chronic after-effect of distemper, and that the dog will probably continue to twitch as long as he lives.
