Head of Higher Educational System Tells Plans

Chancellor Is Introduced to Student Body

Large Gathering Greets Dr. W. J. Kerr

Prink Callison, Bob Hall, Art Potwin Also on Program Of First Assembly

Dr. William Jasper Kerr, chancellor of the Oregon state system of higher education, extended his greetings to the students of the University yesterday in assembly at McArthur court. One of the largest assemblies of students in some time met the new head of this institution.

Congratulations on what he considers to be the best opportunities for students in many years ex-

pressed by Dr. Kerr in his talk in which he further urged students to make the most of these opportunities that they might be worthy of the support given by the taxpayers of the state.

Smaller Classes Liked

Reduced enrollment without proportionate cut in the faculty thus making possible smaller classes with more intimate contact with faculty members was held responsible for the increased opportunities. Students were urged to do whatever they do with interest, spirit, and determination, whether it be classwork or activity work.

The Oregon football team in its game Saturday will face one of the best teams on the coast, it was declared by Coach Prink Callison. The loyal support of the team in the way of applause and cheers as well as attendance at the game was urged.

Potwin Thanks Students

Art Potwin, chairman of the student committee opposing the consolidation bill, thanked students on behalf of the alumni association for their work this summer in the campaign against the measure. A vigilance committee of 24 students will start the final movement of the campaign within the next few days, it was said.

The University band under the direction of John Stehn played a song which has recently been composed for the student body.

Utility Group To Meet Soon In Portland

A meeting of the committee on taxation of public utilities, of which Dr. James H. Gilbert, dean of the social science college, is secretary, will take place at the Imperial hotel in Portland on October 8 for the purpose of filling a vacancy left by the death of Senator B. W. Johnson of Monroe.

The secretary will make a preliminary report on taxation and regulation of municipal utilities. During the spring and summer Dr. Gilbert has carried on extensive research on city-owned utilities, the value of property earnings, and he has secured the consensus of opinion among representative citizens with regard to taxing city-owned property.

Stafford Attends Meet Of Science Association

Professor O. F. Stafford, head of the chemistry department of the University of Oregon, is attending an executive committee meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science at San Francisco. Details of the convention to be held next year at Salt Lake City will be discussed, as well as other minor affairs of the association. Professor Stafford will return to Eugene Sunday evening.

Infirmary Limits Stay to Five Days

Students are to be allowed only five days a term in the infirmary this year, instead of the usual two weeks, according to Dr. Fred N. Miller, head of the University health service. After the five-day period has elapsed, students will be charged at the rate of \$3.00 a day for additional time.

These are cumulative from one term to the next, but not cumulative from one year to the next. Thus, if a student stays out of the

infirmary fall term, he will be allowed ten days during winter term, or fifteen during spring term.

Dr. Miller also announced that the health service has been removed as a department of the school of physical education, and put under the medical school in Portland, with Richard B. Dillebrook.


