



Statement Issued The complete statement of the

findings and decisions of the meeting, uniform for both campuses, is as follows: 1. All motor vehicles in the possession or control of students shall be registered with the enforcement

cars at registration time will be formulated. 2. A sticker for the vehicle will be issued without charge to each student at the time of registering the car.

officer. Details for registering

3. Student motor vehicles shall not be used on the campuses on school days. (The term school days include from Monday morning to Friday evening except holidays.) Provisions for making exemptions will be formulated by the committee of the respective institution.

4. Permission to use a motor vehicle will be withdrawn in every case where it plays a detrimental part in a student's scholarship, discipline, social life, or general welfare. This rule will be invoked in connection with all forms of violation of campus regulations and traditions.

All institutional officers and committees having the administration of regulations, or in any way connected with student welfare, will have the use of cars in mind. This will be particularly true of the scholarship committee, discipline committee, housing committee, and the like.

5. General supervision will be exercised over the use of motor vehicles by students both on and off the campus. 6. Traffic violations both on and

off the campus will be penalized.
