Bas-Relief In
Bronze Hung
In GerlingerWife of Prince L. Campbell
Is CommemoratedPainting of C. H. Chapman Moved
To North Mantel in Old
Library Recently

A bronze portrait in bas-relief of the late Mrs. Susan Campbell, wife of Prince L. Campbell, president of the University of Oregon preceding Arnold Bennett Hall, has just been placed in the north end of alumni hall in Gerlinger hall, opposite the portrait of her husband.

The tablet is the work of Harry Camden, former head of the sculpture department of the University, and replaces a portrait of C. H. Chapman, president of the University from 1893 to 1899, which recently found a new location above the north mantel in the old library.

The tablet bears the inscription from Tennyson: "Yoked in all enterprise of noble end." Below the picture are the words, "Benevolence, Sympathy, Love," and across the bottom: "This tablet is placed here and in affection dedicated by the friends of Susan Campbell."

The portrait of President Chapman which it replaces was the gift to the University of Burt Brown Barker, vice-president, and was painted by Michael J. Muller, who was head of the University department of painting until his sudden death in eastern Oregon two summers ago.

Susan Campbell died at her home in Eugene on September 6, 1932, at the age of 75 years.

Prince L. Campbell died in 1925, after they had been married for 17 years.

Oregon Ranks High—The University of Oregon is ranked as one of the leaders in the field of advancing newer and better methods of teaching, according to Dr. H. L. Dean Dodge placed the University in the same class with Ohio State university and the University of Minnesota, where outstanding work in the field is under way.

Alumni Council Authorizes
Publication of Old Oregon;
Will Appear Early in March

OLD OREGON, alumni magazine was discontinued last May to make way for the more pressing and urgent business of defeating the Zorn-Macpherson bill, will be revived early in March, it was announced last night by Robert K. Allen, alumni secretary.

The decision to again issue the monthly magazine in place of the "Alumni Emerald" which was substituted during the campaign, was made by members of the alumni council, who unanimously voted to resume publication of Old Oregon, which for the past 14 years has served the interests of the University and the alumni association.

Considerable dissatisfaction with the weekly Emerald has been expressed from many former students who have stated that although it served an admirable purpose during the political campaign, it does not now take the place of the more permanent type of publication.

Under the editorship of Miss Jeannette Calkins, Old Oregon became one of the outstanding alumni publications of the country, and it is the hope of the council that the high standard attained by the magazine will be maintained, although financial considerations at the present time make it imperative that the costs be considerably reduced over those of the magazine prior to its last issue in May, 1932.

There will be four issues of Old Oregon during the present school year. They will be March, April, May, and June. This issue of the Alumni Emerald will be the last alumni publication until the reborn Old Oregon appears early in March.

Old Oregon will live again!

For the past several months it has become increasingly evident that the alumni and ex-students of the University desired a more permanent type of publication than that furnished by the weekly edition of the Emerald—especially since the weekly feature of the Emerald was a necessity only during the active campaign against the Zorn-Macpherson bill.

With this thought in mind, members of the alumni council have decided to resume publication of the magazine. The stringency of the times, however, served as a caution sign to the council members, who felt that it would be foolhardy to attempt to publish Old Oregon in the more or less expensive format of the past few years. Thus alumni readers will find in their mail boxes early in March a much less pretentious magazine, but one that will strike a comfortable average with similar publications from many of the country's larger schools.

To the Associated Students of the University, to the members of the Emerald staff and to others who co-operated in every possible way to furnish the association with a medium through which news of the political campaign could be relayed, the association owes a deep debt of gratitude. At all times they were ready and anxious to lend a hand to the association's perplexing problems of the past year.

It might be well, though, to quote the first line of this editorial, "Old Oregon will live again!" and hastily add, "if the alumni themselves are willing to support this move." For without a large list of active members, the magazine cannot hope to continue long. And an alumni publication is nothing more than an expression of the active interest of an association's members in their association and their alma mater.

Hero of Olympics
Quits Sports for
Teaching Career

A. A. U. Awards Hill First Place On All-American Track And Field Team

Ralph Hill, '31, Oregon's major claim to honors at the 10th Olympiad last summer and declared the greatest distance runner ever developed in America, has decided to withdraw from competitive sports and devote his time to "more serious endeavors."

Hill's refusal to accept invitations to compete in various parts of this country and Europe substantiate his withdrawal from athletics and his announced intention of seeking a teaching position for the coming year.

Following soon after Hill's announcement, came word from Daniel J. Ferris, secretary-treasurer of the Amateur Athletic union, that Hill had been awarded first place on the all-America track and field team, chosen by the union.

When Hill waived claims to a foul against Lauri Lehtinen, Finnish runner, in the final few yards of the epic 5,000-metre race at the Olympics, he overnight became America's favorite sportsman. He was named co-holder of the world's record for the race. While attending the University, Hill set a new intercollegiate record in the mile run. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

McEwan, former head football coach at the University of Oregon, tendered his resignation as football coach at Holy Cross college last week, thereby causing to be dropped his suit against the college in which he sought reinstatement.
