Wind, Hail Fail To Stop Trial Heats

Nine Qualify for Finals in Handicap

Thirteen Events Are Scheduled on Program for This Afternoon

Webfoot sprint stars yesterday braved the cold wind and hail at Hayward field in trial heats in the 75 and 150-yard dashes to determine finalists in this afternoon's handicap track meet. Six men, the first three in each heat earned the right to run in each of the dash events today.

Paul Starr, speedy Webfoot captain, overcame handicaps placed against him each distance to race to a pair of victories. He dashed 75 yards in 76 seconds, and led the field by a good margin in his heat of the 150-yard event to win in 15.2.

Walter Hopson, freshman sprinter, finished first in the other 75-yard trial. He, like Starr, ran from scratch. His time was 7.6. In the first heat of the 150-yard trials, Wayne Jamison, stocky sophomore, broke the tape in 15.6. 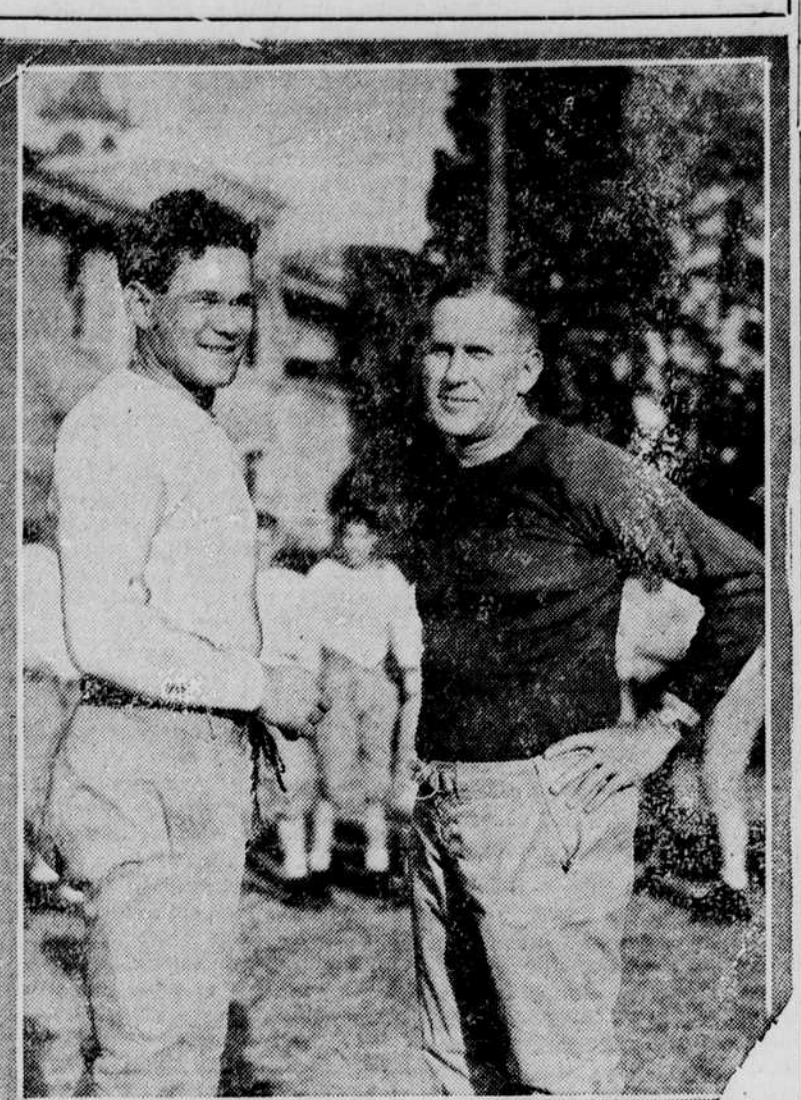
Four Pledges to Law Honorary Are Named

Expect Coaches To Recommend Rules Revisions

Question Raised Over Difference In Calling Fouls on Pivot Rule

NEW YORK, APRIL 7.—(Special)—The post or pivot play was expected to get a thorough going over by the rules committee of the National Association of Basketball Coaches in a meeting held to settle on what changes, if any, they would recommend to the joint rules committee later this week.

Most of the suggestions for rule changes made so far advocate revising the rule that says a guard may not come within three feet of a pivot man when he is inside the free throw area.

The question came up in an informal discussion at a meeting of the board of directors yesterday. It was pointed out that in the west fouls were called concerning this rule differently than in the east. The difference being that here the foul is generally called against the guard while in the east the pivot man is penalized.

Manchuria gave him a profound knowledge of affairs in those countries, and he was selected by the foreign minister, Viscount Uchida, to speak for Japan as chief delegate to the special assembly of the League of Nations.

Matsuoka does not belong to the foreign service and does not know what the Japanese government will want him to do after he returns to that country, but thinks he may enter national political life there, leaving international politics behind for the time being.

year. He was, however, more realistic and much more strong-minded in his presentation than Koo. It was a complement to the faculty and students that he gave a carefully written speech.

Warren D. Smith, head of the geography department, gave a lengthy statement on the subject. "I thought Mr. Matsuoka's address was one of the most finished statements I have heard made by any public official in a long time. His diction and enunciation were very pleasing.

"Since I do not know the real moves behind the scenes in Manchuria, I can not be other than reserved in my acceptance of all his statements. Though I do not like Japan's methods, I have a certain measure of sympathy with her in this Manchurian situation because I know how desperately hard-pressed she is for resources with which to maintain herself industrially.

"Since we have refused ourselves to accept the League of Nations, I do not see how we can criticize Japan too harshly."

Patterson is developing into quite a sprinter and is being counted on for several points this season. He may garner a few more in the broad jump.

Small, but ambitious, Bill Paddock is being looked on to uphold the honor of the neophyte cinder-men in the distances.

Meets this year will be held with Oregon State rooks, one a relay meet and the other a regular meet. Also telegraphic meets will be held with the northwestern college freshman teams. Other meets may be arranged later.
