A PLAN for reviving minor sports on the campus here at a cost of only \$200 to the A. S. U. O. was drawn up by S. Stephenson Smith, tennis coach, and members of the physical education department two weeks ago. The sports to be revived would include tennis, golf, swimming, wrestling, boxing, fencing, and tumbling and apparatus work.

The plan is an admirable one and would provide an outlet in the form of athletic participation of many students who are interested in the particular sports mentioned. While the sponsors of the plan asked for only \$200, it is evident that more money than that will have to be appropriated if the minor sports' program is to be successful.

While it was part of the plan to have physical education instructors coach these sports, the \$200 suggested outlay did not include any money which would pay coaches' expenses on the trips. While several members of the physical education department have signified their willingness to act as mentors for these sports without pay for their service, it seems unfair to require them to bear the burden of paying for their meals, sleeping quarters, and those other things which put dents into the pockets of travelers.

Another difficulty arising from the limited appropriation is the matter of responsibility for accidents on trips. The plan provides that the coach put in charge of a particular sport would not be held personally responsible in case of accident and consequent injury or loss of life to the student athlete in case private autos are used for transportation.

That is all well and good—on the surface. But when the matter is considered, are parents of those students who may be injured or killed on trips going to dismiss this problem and say, "Well, it can't be helped?" That is very unlikely, but who will bear the burden of possible damage suits? Certainly the coaches should not be made to do so, yet they are going to have a hard time talking themselves out of such bad situations. Unless the A. S. U. O. takes the responsibility for possible accidents, this question is enough to put a stop to the operation of the plan. Certainly \$200 is not enough to pay for accidents.

Other problems are certain to come up in the minor sports plan, and unless all contingencies are provided for (it will take more than \$200 in that case), it would be better not to adopt the plan, admirable though it is.

When Bill Hayward waved the third Webfoot runner in the four-mile relay event off the track in the dual meet against Oregon State at Corvallis last Saturday, the need for development of long-distance runners here became evident again. That problem was not so pressing here up till two years ago, when varsity cross-country was abandoned.

At that time, it was planned to conduct the sport on an intramural basis, but nothing has been done about the matter. When questioned, physical education officials in charge of intramurals here declared that they would be willing to add cross-country to their program if Hayward gives the word.

It is unfortunate that the intramural sports program this term was completed so early. One all-star soft ball team has been formed so far to fill up the void, and other teams have been formed by Scabbard and Blade and Alpha Delta Sigma. If other honoraries were to follow suit by organizing "pansy" ball nines, a lot of fun would be had in games between the various organizations. So come on, Alpha Kappa Psi, Asklepiads, Sigma Delta Chi, Skull and Daggers, Phi Delta Phi, Sigma Delta Psi, and all ye other honoraries, scare up some puff ball teams and have some fun.

If beloved Jupe Pluvius would quit crying, Oregon baseball fans might see some extraordinary pitching in the game between the varsity and Monmouth normal on Reinhart field this afternoon. Treadway Charles may start on the mound for the visitors, and he is supposed to be "plenty good." He pitched Franklin high school into the Portland prep league baseball championship last year and is possible future Webfoot material.

Frosh Track Squad Loses To Rooks, 3-2

Baby Orangemen Winners Ninth Year in Row

Dual Relay Meet Decided by Final Event; Ducklings Take Mile And Three-Mile Races

For the ninth straight time the rooks from Oregon State proved themselves superior to the Oregon frosh when they took the annual relay meet from the Ducklings by a score of 3 to 2, on rainsoaked Hayward field yesterday afternoon.

The meet was one of the closest and most thrilling ever held by the frosh and rooks. Not until Ernie Guggisberg, former state interscholastic mile champion, broke the tape just inches ahead of Bill Paddock was the outcome of the meet assured.

The first race of the day, the three-mile relay, was taken easily by the Ducklings. The time of 14:7.1 was slow because of a rainsoaked track and a hail storm during the course of the race. Ryan, the leadoff man for the frosh, grabbed a big lead for the Webfoot babes and they held on to it all through the race.

Rooks Win Quarter Mile
In the next event, the quarter-mile relay, Patterson started the frosh off with a fair lead and they held it until "Speed" Olson, former sprint ace of Los Angeles high school, overtook Stew Milligan, frosh speedster, after Milligan had about a four-yard lead, and beat him to the tape by five feet.

Bob Thomas, husky frosh quarter miler, led the frosh to victory in the mile relay event. On the first lap Thomas just nosed out Warren, rook lead off man, to give Bruce Ewen a slight lead over O'Donnell, rook sprinter. Ewen ran a good lap and gained a couple yards on the rook boy. Humphreys, number three man for the frosh, and Derbyshire, number three rook runner, ran a close lap with Derbyshire winning out in the end. This gave Reynolds, rook anchor man, a slight lead over Whit Arey, frosh star, which the Beaver anchor man held until the last 40 yards, when Arey put on a Merriwell finish to win by about seven feet.

Olson Wins Again
Once more "Speed" Olson led the baby Orangemen to victory. This time he again overcame a 10-foot lead to beat Milligan to the finish mark by four feet, for a rook win in the half mile event.

The final and most thrilling event of the day was the medley relay, which was to decide the fate of the meet. Howard Patterson proved himself to be the best sprinter of the day when he took Olson in the furlong part of the medley. The quarter mile was a close battle between Arey, frosh sprinter, and Reynolds, rook cinder artist, with Reynolds winning out in the finish. This gave Nicholas, rook runner, a slight lead over Ryan, frosh half miler, which Nicholas held only for a short while. Ryan passed the baton to Paddock 50 yards ahead of Nicholas.

Close Race Decides Meet
This lead was not quite enough for Paddock, last frosh runner, to hold over Guggisberg, the rook anchor man. Paddock held the lead until the last 15 yards, but the Oregon babe managed to beat the Duckling to the tape by inches to win the race and meet.

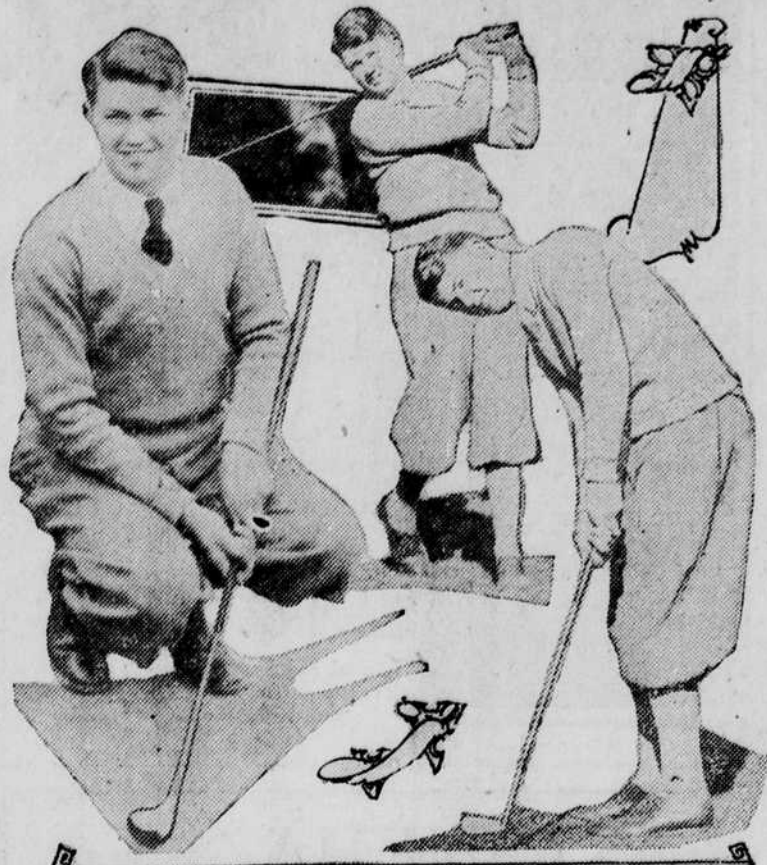
Guggisberg was the individual star of the meet. His time for the four laps was 4:29, which is remarkable time for the mile on a rain soaked track.

'Little Civil War' Baseball Contest Scheduled Today

Frosh and Rook Nines To Battle On Reinhart Field at 10:15, Weather Permitting

Rain caused the postponement of yesterday's scheduled opener of the "Little Civil War," but the game scheduled for here today will be played unless there is more aqua pura falling. Today's tilt is slated for 10:15 on Reinhart field. Johnny Londahl's ball players should have a slight advantage today, playing at home on familiar grounds. The outfielders especially will feel more confident with a fence behind them. The field at Corvallis has no fence, and any ball getting by the fielder is good for a home run. Also, the frosh will have plenty of reserves, if any pinch-hitters are needed. Playing on the Orange field, the frosh can only take three or four extra men, due to the lack of transportation facilities.

Big Ed Thunemann, who was slated to hurl in the opener yesterday, will probably open on the mound for the frosh today. The infield will be composed of Marv Strobe at first, diminutive "Slugger" DeLaunay on second, "Speed" Gordon at short, and "Red" Copp on third. In the outfield will be Bill Johnson, "Tome Take" Hanley, and Eddie Vail. There is a possibility that Fred Lieualen will take over one of the outfield jobs to bolster up the hitting power of the team, but whether his heel will stand the strain or not is still undecided.

This afternoon Londahl put the frosh through a light workout between rainstorms, and the players are all in good shape and on edge, in spite of the inclement weather.

Ten Prep Track Squads To Meet

Eugene, University, Springfield, Cottage Grove, Roseburg, Oakland, Albany, Salem, Corvallis and Chemawa high schools are entered in the Willamette valley track meet to be held on Hayward field today. The day will be cut in half with the preliminary qualifying events at 10 a. m. These events will include the javelin, shot put, high hurdles, low hurdles, 220-yard dash, and the discus. The main events of the meet will start at 2 in the afternoon.
The furlong race is expected to develop real competition with entries including Miller, Oakland sprint ace; Palm of Roseburg; Alee, Indian dash man from Chemawa; and the Eugene high school sprint king, Joe Hill.

After a two-year armistice, Webfoot and Beaver golfers will renew hostilities this morning at 10 o'clock. The battle will take place on the Corvallis links, with the chief weapons of the opposing forces being mashies, number sixes, and drivers.

Arrangements were finally completed last night for the matches, which had been in doubt for the last three days. Don Olsen played Bob Hammond to see who would be No. 3 man, and in an exciting match played Wednesday, Olsen won, 3 and 2. Olsen's score for the round was 76 and Hammond's 81. Yesterday afternoon saw another battle to decide the seventh position. Bob Adelsperger won from Phil Mulder, after a torrid 18 holes of fine golf, by three strokes. Adelsperger's score was 80, while Mulder came in 83.

The first matches on the schedule of the Oregon varsity tennis squad will be played against the Oregon State netmen at Corvallis May 20. The Oregon tennis team will play here May 27, reports S. Stephenson Smith, coach of the Webfoots.

The Oregon players who will trade drives, volleys, and smashes with the Beavers will in all probability be George Economus, Fred Fisher, Lloyd Gordinier, and Harlan Thompson. Economus is one of the ranking junior players in Portland. Fisher is a transfer from Corvallis, while Gordinier has been a member of both varsity and freshman tennis teams here. Thompson is without varsity experience but has shown promise in intramural tournaments on the campus.

The loss of Bob Johnson, who is one of the best racket wielders in the northwest, and Joe Kalisky, varsity letterman, through ineligibility is a hard blow to Duck tennis hopes.
