

Greek Letter Groups Pledge 404 Students in 'Rush' Sessions

Keen Rivalry In Evidence During Week

Portland Number First; Eugene Next

Gamma Phi Beta, Phi Delta Theta Lead Respective Houses With 21 and 20

With competition for members the keenest in years, "rush week" came to a close on the campus with 404 students pledged to Greek letter societies, 209 men and 195 women.

Leading the men's houses was Phi Delta Theta with 20 men pledged. Sigma Alpha Epsilon was second with 18. Gamma Phi Beta led the women's houses with 21 new pledges and Alpha Phi was second with 20.

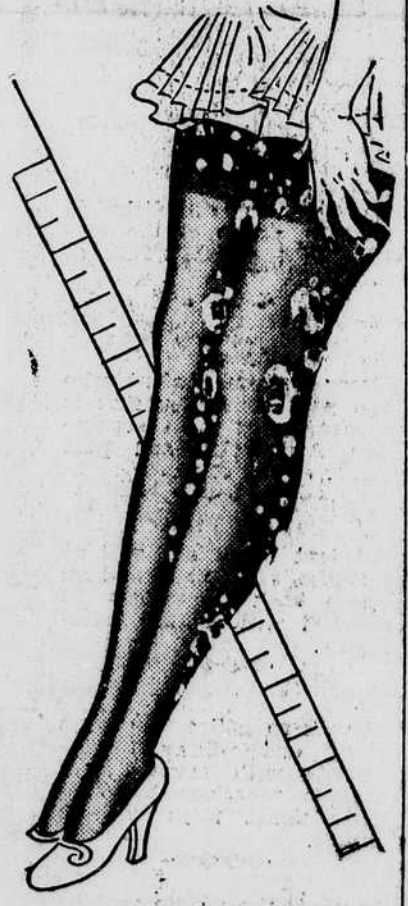
Pledges claiming Portland as their home numbered 150, 78 of whom are men and 72 women. Eugene pledges numbered 42 men and 37 women.

29 Bachelor of Science Awards Presented

I. A. Mather, Education Major, Is Given Doctorate in Philosophy

Work for degrees was completed by 78 students of the University of Oregon between commencement last June and the start of school this fall, it is announced by Dr. Earl M. Pallett, executive secretary and registrar. Recommendation that the degrees be conferred was voted at the last faculty meeting.

Of the number, bachelor of science, with 29, leads the list, with bachelor of arts second with 19. Graduate degrees included 17 master of arts and 9 master of science. One student received a doctor of philosophy degree, the highest academic degree obtainable.

Irving Allen Mather, now of Carpinteria, California, was granted the doctor of philosophy degree, majoring in education. Eugene R. Pearson, Eugene, was granted the degree of master of fine arts.

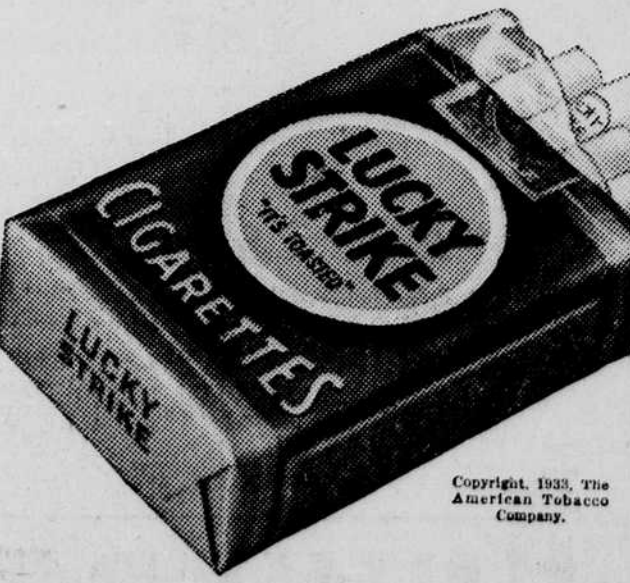

Hendricks Takes First Position in Grade Standings
Sigma Hall Second; Sigma Kappa, Phi Mu, Friendly Hall, and Sigma Pi Tau Next
Hendricks hall topped all campus living organizations in the spring term scholastic ratings with a grade point average of 1.729. Sigma hall, which has been capturing first position in the house standings with regularity, won second place with a score of 1.727.
Sigma Kappa, third on the list, was first among the sorority Friendly hall fifth on the list and second among the men's groups.
Sigma Pi Tau led all fraternities with sixth place in the ratings. Chi Psi was second among the men's houses and was ranked twentieth in the standings.
The all-University average was 1.3983. All the women's groups averaged 1.4582, while the corresponding figure for the men was at 1.285. The rating for all women was 1.491, and the men scored 1.331.
