Washington Cohorts to Visit Rose City

Breakfast Club and Chamber Will Greet Northerners; Tongue And Vail to Attend

PORTLAND, Oct. 6.—(Special)—Prominent Seattle business men, more than 100 strong, will arrive in Portland Monday to extend a challenge to Portland sport enthusiasts to travel to Seattle on October 14 for the annual Oregon-Washington grid classic.

The visitors, who will reach Portland at 7:30 a. m., include members of the Seattle Breakfast club and the senior and junior Seattle chambers of commerce. The University of Oregon band will greet them at the union station, and escort them to the Multnomah hotel for a meeting of the Portland Breakfast club at 8 o'clock, where the challenge will first be issued. The program will be broadcast over station KEX.

A second challenge will be issued at a meeting of the members' forum of the Portland chamber of commerce in the Portland hotel at noon.

Among the guests will be Tom Tongue, University student body president; Mickey Vail, Oregon's yell king; Charles Frankland, Washington's athletic director; and Hugh Rosson, Oregon's graduate manager.

Aaron Frank, originator of the "challenge day" custom, will preside over the meeting of the Breakfast club and Tommy Luke, president of the chamber forum, will rule the noon meeting. Members of Texas Guinan's theater company, soon to be playing in Portland, will provide entertainment at the breakfast session.

Purpose of Chapter to Acquaint Members With Profession, Promote Fellowship

Efforts are being made again to establish Alpha Tau Delta, women's national professional nursing honorary on the Oregon campus. Betty Stimpson is in charge of the movement. Plans for this year's program include discussions and speakers in, and interested in the nursing profession.

The purpose of the campus chapter is: to promote fellowship and discussion groups and to aid members in becoming acquainted with the nursing profession.

Stated in the constitution and by-laws, the national purpose of Alpha Tau Delta is, "to foster friendship and fellowship among college women in the nursing profession."

Several members of the Portland and O.S.C. chapters, now on the Oregon campus, are establishing the honorary here.

Women are eligible for student membership if they are in active attendance with accredited standing in a college, university, or school of nursing, and who are candidates for college degrees and nurses' certificates. Active members are those who possess a college degree and a nurse's certificate.

Any woman interested in belonging to this honorary may call Miss Stimpson at 1770 for further particulars. The first meeting will be held next Wednesday at 4 o'clock in the social science seminar room in Friendly hall.

The Oregon chapter of this honorary was first established as a local four years ago, and was nationalized two years ago.

Articles on State By Gilbert, Smith In New Blue Book

The 1933-34 edition of the Oregon Blue Book which has just been released by the secretary of state contains two articles by University faculty members. One, "Geography and Resources of Oregon," is by Dean James H. Gilbert, of the school of social science, and Dr. Warren Smith, professor of geology and geography, and the other, "Oregon's Outstanding Geological Features," is by Dr. Smith alone.

The former article is concerned with the geographical construction of the state and a brief description of the eight divisions into which the state is divided. The latter article discusses the structural formations at the geological points of interest.

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Morse Speaks to Oregon State Bar

At the annual convention of the Oregon State Bar in Bend last week, Wayne L. Morse, dean of the University of Oregon law school, explained the aims and objectives of the newly-created Pacific Coast Institute of Law for the Administration of Justice.

Dean Morse is chairman of the Institute, which is being sponsored by the Social Science Research Council of America. The first institute meeting is to be held at the University of Oregon during the summer of 1934.

The Oregon State Bar association has accepted the invitation from the University of Oregon law school and the Lane County Bar association to hold next year's convention at Eugene, in conjunction with the institute program.

The Pacific Coast institute will hold a conference each summer at one of the leading universities on the Pacific coast.

Social Attitudes Shown by Tests

The tests which were given to all freshmen last week concerning their attitudes on major social problems such as law, capital punishment, Chinese, and censorship were sponsored by the Carnegie Corporation of New York, according to R. W. Leighton, executive secretary of research. The tests, known as the Thurston tests of the University of Chicago, are being used in the study of appreciation of art to find whether there is a relationship between the ability to appreciate art and the desirable social attitudes.

These tests are being also given to freshmen in art for use in comparing with the average freshmen. It is planned to give a similar group of tests to the same groups of freshmen in the spring term to determine how their attitudes have changed.

Economics Graduate Leaves for Hartford

Eric Forsta, 32, a former football player and a graduate in economics, recently left for Hartford, Connecticut, where he is enrolled in the student corps of the Aetna Life Insurance company.

He will spend several months at study, probably returning to the west coast as a special representative of the company.

It is the policy of the company to accept two or three men from each state each year to train for their higher positions.

DeBusk Confers With Psychology President

Dr. B. W. DeBusk, professor of education, stated today that his trip to Portland Thursday was for a conference with the president of the Child Psychology Association of America and a group of leaders of various sections in the Pacific Northwest.

The conference concerned work done under the pre-school child, mental hygiene of the child, and some phases of the organization.

University Band Called To Meet in Preparation For Football Tilt Today

Indian Basketry Shown in Display

Indian basketry consisting of pieces of various types and origins, from Alaska to California, is included in the exhibition arranged in the old library by Dr. L. S. Cressman, professor of sociology.

Most of the pieces shown are the property of Mrs. Vincent Cook of Portland. Others are from the collection of Dr. Harvey C. Condon. The exhibit consists of several baskets of various designs, a ceremonial hat of the Haida tribe of the northwest region, several adze handles, a knife, a pestle, and other articles used in everyday life by the Indians.

The materials used in weaving the basket are not easy to determine, Dr. Cressman said Thursday. Hazel, spruce roots, and other materials were prepared by the Indians and used in weaving, which was usually done by the men, while the women built the houses and did other heavy work.

Two models of Indian houses are included in the exhibit, one of a Haida house, which is of the type formerly found in the British Columbia region, and the other of a Pueblo house. Both models were made by students in Dr. Cressman's classes.
