Thought and Study Required Of Women Planning Careers

Facing an entirely different prospect than the woman of yesterday, the modern college girl often looks out upon her future with no little doubt as to the part she shall play, or, more important still, what she wants from life. Because the personnel department is constantly coming in contact with adjustment and vocational problems, Dean Karl W. Onthank was asked to give constructive advice to the college girl.

"My advice to a girl who earnestly desires to follow some particular line, but is in doubt about what she is best fitted for, is to spend a good deal of thought and study in fields in which she may be interested. Wide reading along particular lines and acquaintance with people who have followed them will greatly aid her in determining what she can do and find enduring satisfaction in following.

"Many college girls are here with vague and indefinite aims, consequently their energies are scattered. The new generation of women has new problems to face; they are puzzled as to what life has in store for them, they are uncertain and decisive. For this reason it is not surprising that many go on from day to day in the hope

that something will happen to relieve them of the problem of what to do about the future. What they need to do is to acquaint themselves with a wide range of possible modes of living, involving both vocation and other aspects of normal life, so that they can make an intelligent decision as to what will be for them the most satisfactory choice."

Some girls are unhappy at the beginning of college life because it fails to measure up to their expectations, others because they find themselves falling short of their expectations of success in college. In either case adjustments are called for, adjustments which for most are perfectly possible by the use of intelligence, perseverance and the council of advisers, academic and otherwise.

"If she decides to seek a career, the college girl should pursue it with all the ruthlessness and singleness of purpose of a man. If she decides on marriage, she should plan to make a go of it," Onthank continued. "Successful marriages don't happen by accident, but only when both parties work out their plans intelligently. If she wants both career and marriage, she had better pick a career and husband that will go together, a difficult combination, to say the least."

Heads of Houses To Discuss Plan Of Uniform Study

Proposed Program for Women's Houses Recommended By A. W. S.

Further discussion of a uniform study plan for the women's living organizations throughout the campus will be the main topic of discussion at the heads of houses meeting which is to be held Thursday at 4 in the Alpha Chi Omega house.

Ida Mae Nickels, president of heads of houses, stated that a part of the proposed study program has already been approved and recommended by the A. W. S. but that the rest is in the process of being rewritten and the new draft will be gone over at the Thursday meeting.

According to Miss Nickels, the chief difficulty lies in the fact that certain national sororities have rules which they require their chapters to conform to, and these do not coincide with other rules of the same type. In order to get the right working study plan it will be necessary to find a suitable compromise between all of these.

"I think there should be a uniform plan of study and I think it will be possible to get one to fit the local situation," Miss Nickels said. "It will take much time and discussion first, however."

The study plan was suggested last spring by Miss Nickels following a talk by Karl W. Onthank, dean of personnel administration, on scholarship. It was at that time brought out that some uniform system of study would be beneficial to scholarship records and the investigation began. Since then there has been a comprehensive study of local problems with the ultimate aim of a satisfactory study plan.

There was no meeting last week, as scheduled. The last meeting was spent in accepting the budget.
