Ducks Clash With Utah in Next Contest

Ike Armstrong to Bring Strong Eleven

Utes Have Won Rocky Mountain Title Many Times; Hard Battle Predicted

Fresh from their third conference victory over U.C.L.A., the Oregon Webfoots held a workout on Hayward field last night.

The Duck regulars limbered up with a few "wind sprints" and a signal drill followed by a scrimmage session in preparation for the Utah game next Saturday.

The University of Utah, located in Salt Lake City, has won the Rocky Mountain conference football championship several times. Although never able to afford a Pacific Coast conference team much competition the Ute eleven have been the "cock o' the roost" in their conference.

The Utah team is coached by "Ike" Armstrong, recognized as one of the leaders in the coaching profession. This year the Utes present a fairly strong squad. To date they have tasted defeat but once, that at the hands of U. C. L. A., who easily took the Redskins by a score of 21 to 0. In their big game with Utah State last week the Salt Lake eleven won a hard fought 14 to 6 battle from their aggrieved rivals.

When the Indians meet the Ducks on Hayward field this coming Saturday afternoon the Armstrong men will line up in this fashion:

Ends:—Captain Hack Davies and Pete Carlston, veteran ends.

Tackles:—Bob Reeves and Harry Ostler, 215 pound veterans from last year's championship eleven.

Guards:—Dan Savich, all-conference guard last year, and Win Croft, a newcomer.

Center:—Gordy Bridges, a reserve from last year's squad.

Quarterback:—Roland Sleater, recognized by many fans as the smartest field general in the Rockies.

Halfbacks:—Kean Westphal and Aldo Richins, two slippery backs. Fullback:—Sid Kramer, a hard puncher of adamant lines.

Oregon's halfbacks, taken together, easily outshine the Beaver combination of Franklin and Bowman. Temple is an all-American, just as much as Franklin (if not more), and Leighton Gee is fast making a name for himself as the greatest cut-back artist in the game. Mikulak wins easily at full over the hard-working Joslin. "Iron Mike," the all-American, for us any time.

Final score: Beavers, 3; Webfoots, 9. Just about three to one. That's the way it looks, gents, and although we don't want to get cocky, just let those Beavers try to win that Armistice day game. It's in the bag.

Northwest Hopes High for Coast Conference Title

Oregon Holds Undisputed Lead in Race; Oregon State and U.S.C. Second

As a result of the crucial games played last week-end, the Pacific Coast conference race has developed to a critical point. Not since the days of the late Enoch Bagshaw's brilliant reign at the University of Washington, when the mighty Huskies carried off two consecutive coast titles in 1924 and 1925, have northwest fans been so high in their hopes for a championship team from the north. For as the conference standings now reads, two of the three undefeated eleven as well as the holder of the fourth spot are outside of the "golden" state, schools that California officials and sports writers were not so long ago talking of transferring into a separate conference because their inferior teams were detrimental to gate receipts when playing the mighty aggregations from California.

Oregon remains undisputed leader of the conference being undefeated and untied and having won their third league tilt from the U. C. L. A. Bruins 7-0 Saturday before 25,000 fans at the huge Memorial stadium in Los Angeles. Oregon State remains in the title race as a result of her narrow win over the Cougars of W. S. C. at Corvallis. The mighty Trojans received their second scare in as many weeks, but continued at the top of the heap along with the two Oregon eleven.

Stanford faded from the championship picture, dropping one to Washington's already defeated Huskies. Montana gained undisputed possession of the cellar berth, losing to Idaho Saturday. Incidentally, the Vandals jumped ahead of U. C. L. A. and California in the big race.

Minor Injuries Sustained in Tilt With Sons; Jacobs May Start At Fullback

Unsatisfied by a mere four point victory margin obtained in the first of the "little civil war" series, the Oregon frosh began preparations this week for the concluding game of the annual series against the rooks Friday night at Bell field.

The first frosh-rook game played here ended 7 to 3 for the frosh. Since then a great deal of water has flown into Bell field and the Oregon yearlings hope to win Friday's game by a larger margin. Last Saturday the Southern Oregon Normal eleven were fortunate in beating the frosh 7 to 0. The Sons had previously downed the rooks 39 to 0.

Monday and yesterday the yearlings scrimmaged the varsity. Tonight they will scrimmage alone and Thursday the turnout will be limited to a light pre-game workout.

Minor injuries sustained in the Sons game slowed the squad up the first two days of this week, but the team will be in good shape for the rooks. Bishop injured his leg Saturday, but will probably see action Friday. Jacobs, reserve full, will probably get the call over Konopka if Bishop has to be replaced. Konopka missed most of the early practices because of an injured foot.
