#### Student Problems **Topic Discussion** At Mothers' Meet

Executive Councils of Parents Hear Talks by Deans Earl And Onthank

The executive councils of Oregon Mothers association and the Portland Mothers met yesterday morning in Gerlinger hall for an informal discussion of such matters as house libraries, scholarship guidance, the work of house mothers, orientation courses, and the proposed vocational conference for next month.

Dean Karl W. Onthank of the personnel administration spoke to the gathering briefly, outlining the general program of work carried on in the personnel field, illustrating his talk with a chart.

Virgil D. Earl, dean of men, also addressed the meeting.

A welcome was extended to the mothers, and their cooperation was asked to help advance the standing of the University.

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
