En route to their next game, the Celtics discussed the "play," mapped out possibilities whereby it actually could be used in an effective offense. They found, after several experiments, that Dehnert's guard quite frequently stepped the wrong way, opening the door for an excellent fake play. Dehnert would whirl to the other side and dart into the basket for a set-up. They worked other variations of the play. Dehnert became a master at its execution.


