Germans Make Intensive Plans for '36 Olympiad To Be Held in Berlin

With the yanking of the teeth of Chancellor Adolph Hitler's anti-Semitic agitation concerning the 1936 Olympic games, it appears Berlin, after all, will be the scene of the event as scheduled. Objections on the part of the A. A. U. and the open hostility of the Olympic association have been treated to generous applications of salve, so barring a renewal of the breach the Germans will promote the affair as originally planned.

Judging from the way Germany is going ahead with the construction plans, there evidently has never been any doubt in the minds of Hitler's subjects that the anti-Jewish controversy as it concerned participation in the Olympics could be ironed out to the satisfaction of all foreign nations entered in the competition.

As well planned as was the 1932 plant in Los Angeles, the Californians stack up as pikers when compared with the Germans, who have already begun work on what will be the finest and most centralized plant ever to grace the site of an Olympiad. Instead of having the various stadia scattered about the city as they were in Los Angeles, Berlin will entertain with the entire group of exhibition centers within the bounds of a 285-acre tract, according to information divulged in the Olympic News Bulletin.

The main stadium, for track and field events, will seat about 100,000 persons. It will be a permanent structure. The entire area to the west of the Olympic stadium is to be a festival ground, accommodating 250,000 persons, and will be surrounded by high stands.

Included in the list of sports stadia provided are:

Swimming stadium of 10,000 seating capacity, a swimming hall and a bathing lake.

Tennis was taken off the Olympic sport schedule but there will be a tennis stadium, accommodating 10,000 spectators.

A cycling track of 333 meters will have a covered stand for 15,000 spectators.

Equestrian sports and contests will have their own field, also.

Plans for housing the athletes have not been announced; but they will doubtless be quite as up to date as those at Los Angeles.

At Berlin the spectator will have his day made much easier by the compactness of the layout. At the 1932 Olympics the cycling track was many miles distant, at Pasadena; boxing and wrestling were at a downtown arena; fencing was held on the edge of the Olympic grounds in an armory; equestrian sports were held at the Riviera Country club, a considerable distance away and the training fields were scattered around all over the city.

It is planned to have the entire Berlin program conducted on the one area of considerably less than one-half a square mile.

Already the Germans are talking the 1936 Olympiad seriously. Hitler himself is sponsoring the movement which he hopes will put an effective German team against the rest of the world in this event which is the first of the famous games ever to be brought to Ger-

Phi Delt and S.P.E. End As Champions In Donut Volleyball

Spec 'A' and Yeomen 'B' Squads Lose In Final Tilts on Schedule; Individuals Star

Phi Delta Theta and Sigma Phi Epsilon are the new donut volleyball champions. The Phi Delt "A" six came back after a weak start to upset the dope with a last-minute victory over the S. P. E.'s and in the other competition the Yeomen were unable to overcome the favored S. P. E. "B" leaguers.

The Phi Delt was completely routed in their first tilt with McCaughy of the S. P. E.'s leading his six to an easy 10-point lead before the other team scored, and then continuing the rout to finish the contest at 15-1.

Using a time-out period to advantage in both of the final matches, the Phi Delt looked like an entirely different team as they turned the tables on their opponents to win the second encounter easily and just edge out a victory in the final one.

In the second canto Olsen started booming his hard kills as he received good setups from his Phi Delt teammates and ran up a 12-4 lead before they became disorganized and let the S. P. E. six grab five counters to make the score 12-9. At this point the Phi Delt took their effective time out and, starting again, pushed over three points to their opponents' one to even the count on games.

 McCaughy drew first blood for the S. P. E.'s in the final tilt, but the Phi Delt knotted the count at 4-all and then drew ahead to a 7-5 lead as Olsen, Bauer, and Hunter started clicking. Wishard then shifted to the front ranks for the S. P. E.'s and drove over a few effective spikes to give them a 9-7 advantage.

As they started to crumple, the Phi Delt again took their telling time-out period and made five counters good while their opponents were pushing across three. This evened the score again at 12-all where it stayed for a few minutes before shifting to 14-14.

Then with both sides nervously trying to play safe Bauer made a good spike for the Phi Delt for one of the necessary counters, and Wishard returned a ball that went out of bounds by inches to give Phi Delta Theta the other point and the title.

Both teams played the three games without substitution with the following lineups: Phi Delt—Olsen, Bauer, Hunter, Houghton, Kneeland, and Chamberlain. S. P. E.'s—McCaughy, Wishard, Elliott, Foley, Anderson, and Jacobs.


