Business Ad **Offers Useful Type of Work**

Hoyt Reports Splendid **Record for School**

Oregon Accounting Department Is Outstanding, Foreign Trade **Courses** Practical

A splendid record has been made by the University school of business administration, according to a report prepared by H. V. Hoyt, dean of the school.

"It should be a source of interest and pride to learn of the successes and of the type of work now offered in our schools of business and commerce in Oregon," declared Hoyt in a radio address given last January.

There are six definite specialized fields of business available for upper division students at the University: accounting, marketing and advertising, finance, foreign trade, statistics and research, and production and factory management. **Figures** Available

Several convincing figures are available as to the status of the Oregon school.

From a survey of seven states conducted in 1929 by the United States office of education, it was discovered only 11 per cent of the total number of college students from Oregon went to colleges out of the state to get their college education. This was the lowest percentage of any of the states used by the commission in its comparisons, whereas in other states used for comparison, 15 per cent or more of the college students got their collegiate education outside of their respective home states.



Literature of **Indian Folk** In CWA Study

Extension Dean Powers Lays Out Course

Research Among Descendants of **Original Residents Here Gets** Material for Text

The literature of the Oregon Indian, missionary, explorer and pioneer is one of the new courses for the civil works projects in adult education in Oregon. The course is being worked out by Alfred Powers, dean of the extension division of the Oregon state system of higher education, and two graduates of the University of Oregon. The name of the course is "Oregon Literature" and two chapters in the text have been completed. The first chapter, "Oregon Literature Before the White Man Came." deals with the literature of the native races of Oregon-the many Indian tribes. Their literature was surprisingly rich in poetry, song and other forms, according to Dean Powers.

Has Essays on Dreams

An essay on the dreams of the Coos Bay Indians is part of the chapter. The dreams were recently discovered from the tales of a few lingering old people of the tribe. Dr. Melville Jacobs, of the University of Washington anthropology department, assisted in the chapter. 


