Struck yesterday was a sound blow for the judiciary. Alfred A. Wheat, chief justice of the District of Columbia supreme court, quietly handed down a decision that is bound to cause a great deal of noise. Ruled Justice Wheat: Unconstitutional is the Roosevelt railway retirement law. The gist of the verdict in favor of the American Railway associations: Con-

gress, in providing for a "melting pot" of rail carrier contributions amounting to \$125,000, overstepped its powers in levving assessments with no regard to the beneficiaries participation in interstate commerce. Over interstate commerce. which is trade between two or more states, congress has regulatory power; over intrastate commerce, trade within the boundaries of a single state, the nation's legislative body has none.

Deck Stacked?

In the "gold clause" case, however, the New Dealers hold most of the cards. The case is briefly stated: When the Roosevelt forces called in private gold under appeals to the patriotic spirit and vaguely cloaked threats of legal procedure they found one big difficulty. Outstanding were many private, municipal, and national bond issues made payable on their face "in gold coin of the present standard of weight and fineness." By Washington's clever seizure of private gold and sharply subsequent devaluation of the money which they gave out in return, a coup was struck that netted the government millions.

And Where Were the Bonds?

Left high and dry, however, were the various obligations which promised to pay in "gold coin." Mr. Roosevelt by his inflationary measures has made all holders of these bonds entitled to \$1.69 on the baloney dollar. It is the legality of these "promises to pay," which the New Dealers now ask the supreme court to repudiate. The particular case (one of a leading railway concern) is expedited because the government has unhappily advanced the railway some \$23,000,000 on a second mortgage, payable when the first bond issue is no longer outstanding, and if the railway must pay out its holders in pre-deflation gold values, there is not liable to be enough left to pay the government.

Forgotten Test Case

As yet, citizens have heard nothing of the threatened cases against those who held personal property higher than inflation talk, kept their gold against the threats of the government. Into the limbo of forgotten measures must these prosecutions have passed.

Action After the Fact In this case, however, the New Dealers are acting along a well known plan. They can say to the supreme court: "We have already devaluated our currency - now what can you do about it? If you fail to support us, you will wreck the financial standing of the nation.
