The two Pacific coast conference teams meet here tomorrow afternoon in renewal of a football feud that started in 1893. The game 41 years ago ended, so the old grads says, with members of each team hurling epithets and rocks at each other. Indications were that a University of Idaho raiding party visited the campus between 1 and 4 clock this morning, after Wash ington State guards had retired.


