

Conference Of Rifle Squads Blythe's Hope

Seeks Sporting Basis for Marksmanship; Wire Meets Suggested

Varsity Positions Sought By 30 Candidates

The possibility of competition between rifle teams on the same conference basis as that for other sports was pointed out yesterday by Sergeant Harvey Blythe, coach of the University of Oregon rifle team.

Instead of the present individual set up, with each team scheduling telegraphic matches with as many other colleges as possible, a regular conference would be formed under the sponsorship of the National Rifle association. During the winter term the conference schools would compete in a series of telegraphic matches which would culminate in a conference meet at some central point, with both team and individual prizes awarded.

Because matters of financial sponsorship and more detailed information will have to be discussed between the schools, Sergeant Blythe said that no action on the proposed plan will be taken till next year.

Scores Good This Year

During this week elimination is taking place to determine which of the 30 candidates will make up the 15-man team to represent the University in the opening matches. Sergeant Blythe states that scores made this year are as good or better than those turned in at this time last year by the crack team which won 22 of 24 matches and placed it second in the national five-man championships and seventh in the national ten-man matches.

Although the 15 men who finish this week with the highest scores will make up the team for the first matches, the marksmen who do not place will shoot unofficially during the matches and may displace members of the team in the future. The tryouts, as well as the telegraphic matches are of 40 shots to the man, 10 in each of the prone, sitting, kneeling, and standing positions, with a time limit of one minute for each shot.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 29.—(AP)—Franklin and Jefferson, Portland's state basketball tournament representatives last season, jumped into the win column as the 1935 Portland prep race began today.

In the week ending February 23, they shoot against Washington university in St. Louis, South Dakota State, University of Kentucky, Montana State and Oklahoma A. & M.

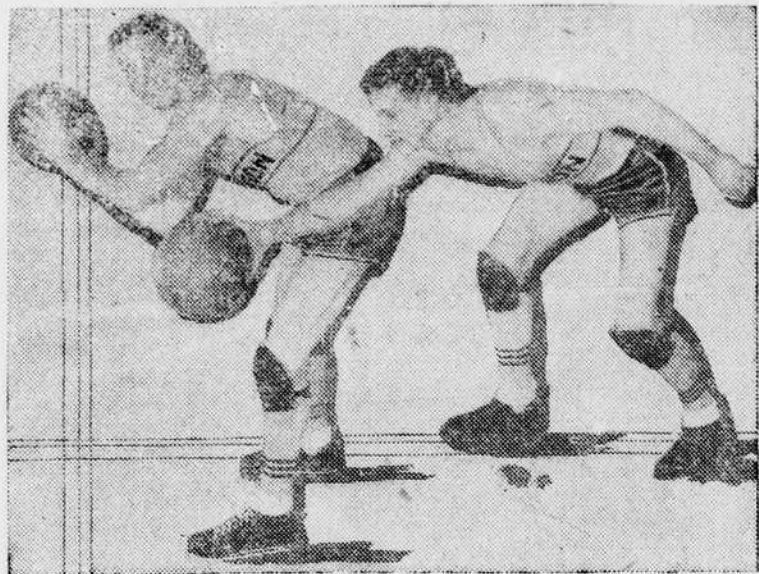
